I would like to inform the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors that the Jefferson County Office of Emergency Management has received \$68,496.40 in grant funding as part of our contract with the State of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Emergency Management in completing our Plan of Work for the Federal Fiscal Year 2010 from October 1, 2009 through September 20, 2010.

Again this year, the Finance Department has compiled an annual report of the County Board's meeting fees and expenses for 2010. The report contains a summary of all the committee meetings attended by County Board Supervisors and citizen appointees.

As 2010 was an election year, you will notice there are more than 30 supervisors listed. The report reflects partial terms and resignations during 2010. Therefore, it is a bit more difficult to draw conclusions and establish averages. Total number of meetings attended was 1688 down from 2009's total of 1886, a reduction 198. This amounted to a savings of \$12,965, and was the third year in a row that the Jefferson County Board reduced the number of meetings and carried over a surplus to the next fiscal year.

We can attribute some of the savings to good management by committee chairs. Committee chairs now meet as a group every three or four months to discuss meeting management and issues of mutual interest. This allows new chairpersons to ask questions and brings some uniformity to how committees are run. Committee chairs continue to review their committee agendas with a goal to maximize efficiency and avoid meeting when not necessary, while providing oversight to their departments.

I would be remiss not to acknowledge the professionalism and acts of generosity by individual supervisors who regularly waive their meeting fees and mileage. The County Board continues to demonstrate fiscal restraint by again forgoing any increase in meeting fees and salary through April 2012. The Jefferson County Board has not raised their compensation since 2003 which amounts to eight years without an increase.

The County Board has completed our strategic planning process. This effort has provided guidance to Jefferson County Government as a whole. The plan will provide clarity for us as we move into the future, and help us better communicate with our constituents separating fact from fiction. The Jefferson County Board continues to be an example of public service at the highest level with an emphasis of providing "Responsible Government Advancing the Quality of Life".

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Jefferson County Board supports income maintenance service delivery through a hybrid county/state model designed to capture significant cost savings and retain local access for service recipients.

DRAFT PROPOSED STATEWIDE IM MODEL (4/4/2011)

This draft hybrid model incorporates state, county and private staff into a County/State administered service delivery system covering a statewide caseload of Foodshare and Medicaid cases. The current caseload is 548,712 (all IM programs except for BC+ Basic, SeniorCare, and WWMA). This model will reduce the overall number of positions currently administering the programs and creates new efficiencies while improving customer service. The model encourages applicants to apply online but maintains the ability for in-person applications in at least one physical location in each county and tribe.

Basic Model Assumptions

- 1. If the number and types of cases included in this service delivery model changes, future planning with all parties responsible for administration of the programs will need to occur to avoid increases in costs and decreases in customer service.
- 2. The model's caseloads and costs are currently built to serve only Foodshare and Medicaid cases, but flexibility has been built into the model for it to also serve Child Care (and possibly portions of W-2) in the future. If additional programs join the service delivery system additional efficiencies and cost savings could be achieved.
- 3. All ongoing IM cases will be part of a statewide caseload so that cases can be leveled across all workers' caseloads in the state, initially and on an on-going basis.
- 4. Two statewide inboxes would be need to be created, one for EBD/LTC cases and one for all other IM applications.
- 5. Other changes to the CARES administrative structure need to be carefully considered in this plan to allow for any economic support worker to perform work on any case across the statewide caseload.
- 6. Second party reviews, completed by the recommended centralized unit, should occur as quickly as possible after confirmation. The number of second party reviews should be set at 3% of the current caseload.
- 7. EBD/LTC ongoing cases would remain in the county agency the customer chooses in order to provide face-to-face service and coordination with other agencies such as MCOs and ADRCs.
- 8. New applications will be processed on a first in-first out basis by an eligibility worker somewhere in the state depending on availability of the staff. Once an

INITIAL DRAFT

application is processed and the case is open and ongoing, the case will be transferred to the local agency nearest the customer's home (or to any office the customer might request to make service access more convenient) that has capacity to accept another case. This will be determined by a comparison of caseload counts.

9. Agencies must be held accountable for meeting established performance measures. This should be monitored through the State's regional offices.

Funding for the New Model

- 1. If a county continues to deliver Income Maintenance Services at a level equal to or greater than the level they were providing during calendar year 2009, a county would continue to keep their local county-tax levy funds to provide services under the new model.
- 2. If a county decides to no longer provide Income Maintenance Services in this new model, that county would need to contribute the amount of county tax levy they were expending during calendar year 2009, so that either another county could deliver services in that geographic region, or for the State to hire State staff to physically provide services in that county.
- 3. State dollars (and matching federal dollars on those State dollars) would be distributed to all Income Maintenance Service providers under a new funding model that would recognize a combination of cases being served (anticipated to be 650 cases per worker and number of FTE staff devoted to performing call center/change center statewide functions). It is envisioned that another very brief commitment survey would need to be completed by all counties to gather FTE counts agencies would want to devote to the two types of functions. Once that info is gathered, the workload and finance committee of IMAC could run a more comprehensive Income Maintenance funding proposal for all service providers.

Future Considerations of this Model

- 1. The new Income Maintenance service delivery system should interface closely with National Health Care reform. It will be important to continue an integrated services model for the Medicaid population that will not be included in the "Health Exchange" (individuals having incomes less than 133% of federal poverty). Income Maintenance service providers want to plan closely with Department of Health Service's officials to ensure that any eligible customers using the Health Exchange Portal can quickly and efficiently obtain Medicaid services if they qualify for those benefits.
- 2. The new Income Maintenance service delivery system needs to focus on having close connections to health system providers, Federally Qualified Health Care

Centers (FQHC's), emergency shelters, and other community agencies serving the poor. Many service providers already use these excellent partnership opportunities to increase access to services.

- 3. The new system needs to be responsive to State resident's schedules and should ensure that face-to-face appointments can happen early mornings, early evenings, and potentially on some weekends (Saturdays).
- 4. Greater efficiencies can also be achieved with increased and improved automation. We would like to:
 - Find alternate software to replace Call Center Anywhere for the statewide call/change center
 - Study the feasibility of using tele-health to take face-to-face interview in remote portions of the State, and
 - Implement a web-based client scheduler application to allow state residents to quickly and efficiently make Income Maintenance appointments from any computer in the State.

Next Steps

- 1. This model will now be shared with the Wisconsin County Human Services Association, the Wisconsin Counties Association, the Department of Health Services, the Department of Children and Families, the Legislative Fiscal Bureau, advocacy agencies, and other community partners for review and feedback. Further revisions to the model will be made based on all of these entities' feedback.
- 2. If there is agreement to move this model forward, approximately 8 workgroups will be formed to further refine each important subsystem of this model:
 - Call/change center
 - Application processing
 - Centralized scanning
 - Information technology
 - WFCAP
 - Training
 - Second Party reviews
 - Benefit Recovery/Subrogation/Fraud
