

1. On 01/26/2018, I am meeting with Professor Meg Waraczunski and her graduate interns to finalize Matched Pair demographics for the Outcome Evaluation of the Alcohol Treatment Court. Following this meeting, we will implement the data collection with DOC. I will compile and maintain the Matched Pair data. We will also begin discussions on collecting Matched Pair data for Drug Treatment Court participants. The Outcome Evaluations will occur when 50 participants have exited each program for 1 year.
2. I have been in contact with Professor Paul Gregory from U. W. Whitewater regarding a Process Evaluation of the Alcohol Treatment Court Program. This evaluation consists of a policy review and series of interviews with Treatment Court Team members and Others involved in the program. The evaluation will examine the program's adherence to WATCP/DOJ Treatment Court Standards and evidence based practices. Specific dates have not been determined yet. Dr. Gregory is consulting with his students about tentative dates.
3. The 2018 Grant has been approved in full and all grant documents have been signed. The packet will be submitted to the Dept. of Justice as soon as the contract is signed with WCS, which must accompany the award packet. We are working with WCS on finalizing the contract for 2018.
4. Drug maker Alkermese has provided the sample short of Vivitrol to the jail. 5 shots were received yesterday. The manufacturer has committed to maintaining this supply and a procedure is in place to do so.
5. Through the grant modification approved in December, we arranged for the purchase of 51 shots of Vivitrol from Mueller Pharmacy. Mueller has created an account and for Treatment Court participants. These shots will primarily be used for people newly released from jail, who don't have insurance or whose insurance is inadequate to cover the shot.
6. All Drug Treatment Court participants have been entered into the CORE database from point of referral into the program to the present. WCS is continuing to work on entering the Alcohol Treatment Court participant information into CORE. Once this is complete and those participants are deleted from the previous TAD database, the remaining participant data will be migrated from the TAD database into CORE. No firm date has been established for his data migration yet.
7. The CORE reports functions have not been activated yet and we are only able to enter data at this point. I will be following up with the DOJ on a date for these features to be made available.
8. We are exploring expanding our offerings of tangible incentives for the Treatment Court Programs beyond gift cards and candy.

9. The Jefferson County Drug Free Coalition has organized 8 free Narcan/Heroin Overdose trainings with assistance from the Bridges Library System. These trainings are posted in the Courthouse and will be made available on the Jefferson County Drug Free Coalition Website.

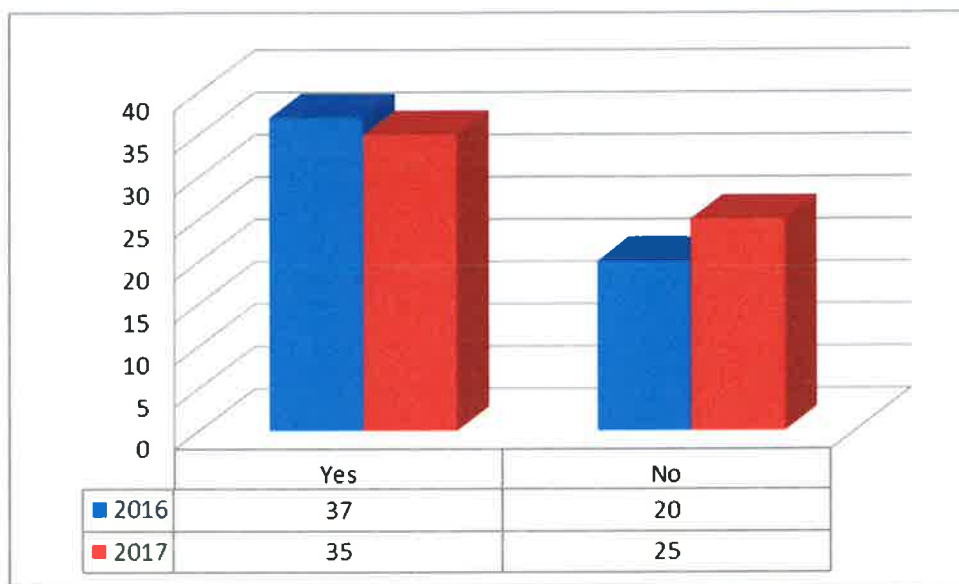

## AODA Program

(offered during the fall/spring semesters)

Winther Counseling Lab offers an AODA Program designed for individuals facing issues related to drug/alcohol use. The AODA-4 and AODA-15 programs both consist of AODA related assessment, education, and individual counseling.

### To receive these services...

Bring written documentation of your mandate (indicating AODA 4 or AODA 15) and payment to Winther Counseling Lab during the hours of 9:00am - 5:00pm, Monday through Thursday during the fall/spring semesters. Cash or money order will be accepted. For individuals enrolled at the university, the student billing process can be utilized.

#### **AODA 4 = \$40.00**

Session 1 - 4 (see Program Design)

#### **AODA 15 = \$150.00**

Session 5 - 15 (see Program Design)

Fees are non-refundable.

Upon receipt of your complete payment as well as documentation (indicating AODA 4 or 15), your first appointment will be scheduled.

## Program Design

### Session 1 & 2: Client Intake/AODA Assessment

Goals: Provide the client the opportunity to assess the role of alcohol and other drug use in his/her life. Explore the impact of alcohol and other drugs in the various realms of the client's life such as physical health, social compatibility, emotional well-being, academic/occupational success, and family relationships.

#### Objectives:

- Reflect on past alcohol/other drug use utilizing formal assessment tools.
- Identify alcohol and other drug use patterns and examine the factors that influence use.
- Identify specific examples of how alcohol and other drug use affect various aspects of the client's life.

### Session 3-4: AODA \*Education & Awareness

Goals: Provide the client the opportunity to openly discuss and explore alcohol and other drug use in high school. Identify situations that increase risk taking and the consequences of high risk behavior. Develop strategies to avoid negative consequences from high risk alcohol or other drug use.

#### Objectives:

- Identify individual opinions about the legal drinking age.
- Reinforce the legal drinking age in Wisconsin.
- Recognize consequences for following/not following the law.
- Determine willingness to accept consequences of decisions.
- Understand how Blood Alcohol Concentration is determined and what it means for the individual.

## Program Design (cont'd)

### Education & Awareness Objectives (cont'd)

- Learn to identify what "a drink" really looks like in terms of measurement/quantity.
- Understand the importance of obtaining assistance for someone who is "passed out and unresponsive"
- Continue to identify risky situations and to recognize how peer pressure and other factors influence decision-making.
- Identify strategies to address peer pressure and other factors that contribute to risky behaviors.

### Session 5-15: Individual Counseling

Goals: Provide the client the opportunity to continue examining personal issues in a therapeutic setting. Facilitate ongoing AODA education and awareness by integrating these elements into client's self-exploration.

#### Objectives:

- Identify physical, social, emotional, occupational, academic and/or other concerns. Explore thoughts and feelings regarding concerns.
- Identify current strengths and barriers in the client's life, and develop strength-based strategies/goals to address barriers and concerns.

As part of the AODA 15 program, clients may be asked to complete individual assignments designed to help them reflect on behavior choices. Up to 3 hours of "Homework Projects" may be utilized as part of the required 15 program hours.

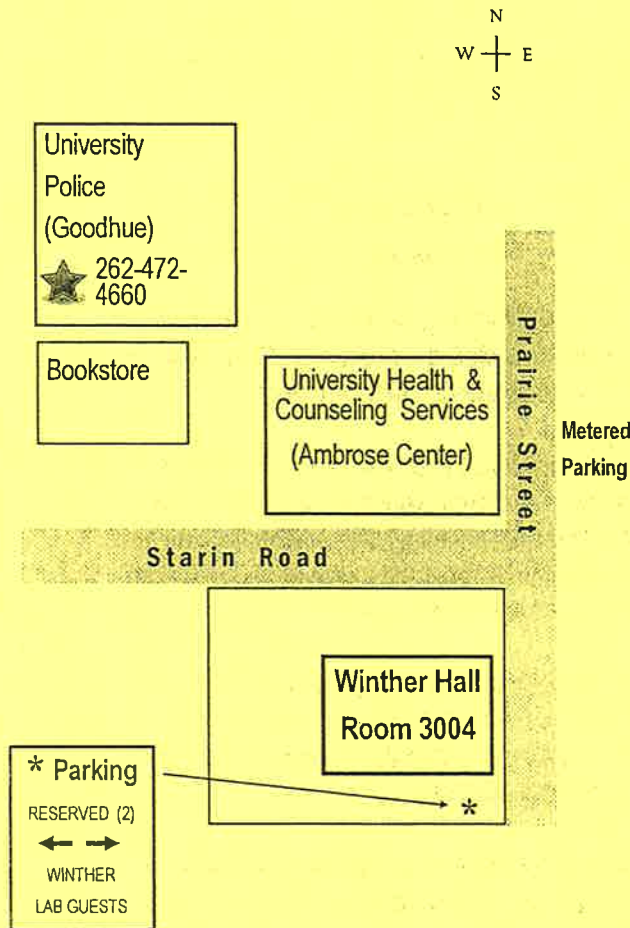

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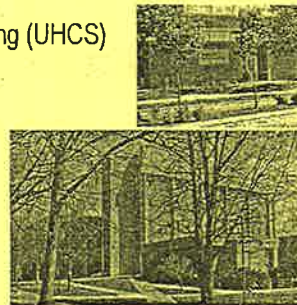
