1. Call to Order

Tietz called the meeting to order at 9:30am

2. Roll Call

Present: Tietz, Foelker, Christensen, Kelly, Payne Others: Nehmer, Nimm, Wiesmann, Schroeder, Sheriff Paul Milbrath Bob Bennet, Jefferson County Snowmobile Alliance

3. Certification of Compliance with the Open Meetings Law

Meeting was posted in compliance with the Open Meetings Law

4. Review of the Agenda

Agenda approved as written

5. Public Comment (members of the Public who wish to address the Committee on specific agenda items must register their request at this time)

Harry Boos - Eagle Scout Fort Atkinson – distributed a map showing a new bench and 10 trees (species yet to be determined) proposed to be planted and placed along the Glacial River bike path (along the trail near the Human Services complex in an effort to shield and shade trail users. Funds are being raised with a goal of a sponsor per tree with each tree having a plaque naming the sponsor.

6. Approval of the April 6, 2015 Meeting Minutes

Kelly motioned/Christensen seconded to approve the April 6, 2015 minutes. 5/0 voice vote, motion passes.

7. Communications

a. Donations - Rick Olsen, Modern Woodmen

Wiesmann noted that Rick Olsen of Modern Woodmen donated plant materials to plant around both Carnes east and Carnes west entrance signs.

8. Discussion and Possible Action on Supporting Local Stewardship Fund Resolution

Nehmer – indicated the committee discussed the resolution at the April Meeting. Nehmer questioned if the Committee supports the resolution, assembled by Wehmeier, regarding the support of Local Stewardship funds.

Schroeder – noted that Admin and Rules Committee edited the resolution for the purposes of Jefferson County.

Foelker motioned/Christensen seconded to support the Local Stewardship Fund Resolution.

Kelly – questioned if the stewardship resolution limits the county property purchases.

Payne – guestioned if the executive summary should be edited.

5/0 voice vote, motion passes.

9. Discussion and Possible Decision to Update the Jefferson County Bicycle & Pedestrian Plan Purpose: Amend 2010 Jefferson County bicycle plan to include a new mountain bike facility on county grounds surrounding the Jefferson County Human Services complex. Should the committee decide to amend the plan the amendment will be listed as an addendum to both the Jefferson County Bicycle Plan

and the Jefferson County Bicycle Plan Emphasis Summary.

Nehmer – this would be an addendum to the County's general plan, legally covering the project, allowing the department to indicate the project is in a plan when submitting future grant applications.

Christensen motioned/Foelker seconded to amend the 2010 Jefferson County bicycle plan.

Foelker- guestioned if the Human Services Department is in favor of the project.

5/0 voice vote, motion passes.

10. Discussion and possible Decision on illegal activity at Kanow Park - Sheriff Milbrath

Milbrath – stated that the JCEC's noted that there has been a substantial increase of non-family friendly activity in the park, with said activity driving away other parks patrons. The Sheriff's department will implement a sting operation in an effort to control the unfavorable activity.

Tietz – questioned if video cameras would help curb activity.

Milbrath – noted the cameras would be expensive and the department's ability to monitor the cameras and respond in a timely manner is limited.

11. Discussion and Possible Decision on Potentially Transferring Ownership of Welcome Travelers Park

Nehmer – noted the 9 acre park at Hwy 59 & Hwy D does not fit into the description of a natural resource park. Nehmer introduced the possible transfer of ownership of this park to the City of Whitewater. The park was purchased in 1939 for approximately \$1,000.

Christensen – stated that if the park is transferred that it be kept as a park and if the transfer were to take place, could we remove the disc golf equipment and use elsewhere.

Schroeder – questioned the revenue generated by the park.

Kelly – ok with pursuing options

Payne – inquired about including a condition of the transfer to include continuation as park under new ownership.

Discussions with the City of Whitewater will continue.

12. Discussion and Possible Decision on Park Tour

The Parks Committee and Staff are scheduled to tour the parks Thursday, May 28 @ 9:00a.m.-3:00p.m.

13. Update on Dog Park Concerns

Nehmer – stated that the owner of a large (boxer mix) dog has been cited as a result of her large dog killing a small dog. It has been determined that the said dog is no longer allowed at the dog park and the owner is banned from the park for a period of one year. Both owners were in the park "after hours" and unaware of each other's presence. The small dog owner was jogging in the large dog area of the park, after hours, with a small dog when the large dog approached the small dog.

Wiesmann – noted that having small dogs in the large dog area is a disregard of the park rules.

14. Update on Playground Installation – Wiesmann

Wiesmann – Travelers Playground was installed, graded and seeded two weeks ago. Last Saturday, the Pohlmann Playground was installed with the help of a fundraising effort held by Eagle Scout Austin Messerschmitt. Border, woodchips and benches will be installed this week at Pohlmann.

15. Update on Land Management, Prairie Fires - Wiesmann

Wiesmann – noted that the larger parks require prairie and woodland restoration annually to maintain biodiversity and limit invasive species. Prairie burns are scheduled approximately every 3 years. The burns are broken into mosaic segments. A PowerPoint was shown to the committee illustrating the burn areas and the playgrounds.

Payne – questioned if the department posts burn notices to alert the neighbors/public awareness. Christensen – questioned if the department does a reptile sweep prior to the burns.

16. Update on Submittal of Stewardship Grant Application(s)

Nimm - noted that she was fortunate the Interurban Trail application was submitted last year as this gave her a base starting application for the 227 page application she and Nehmer submitted on April 29th, prior to the May 1, 2015 application deadline. Nimm also noted that she and Nehmer completed an application for the Watertown Outboarders Rock River Cappie's Landing project.

17. Update on Holzhueter Implementation Plan Process

Wiesmann – stated there has been no changes since the April meeting and we are still waiting on Trek for trail layout.

18. Update on Glacial Heritage Area (GHA) Project - Greg Matthews

Matthews – noted the WTO Implementation is complete and ready for signature by the DNR's Division Administrator for Lands. He also noted that at this point there is no opposition to naming the park "Rock River Access Cappie's Landing."

19. Update on Fundraising for Interurban Trail

Nehmer – noted that the fundraising to date is included in the packet.

Nimm - noted that she will be investigating a crowdsourcing website named 'Crowdrise' as a means of fundraising for the Interurban Trail on a global level.

20. Update on 2015 Parks Department Budget

Financials dated March 31 - April 21 for Period 3 was included in the packet. Nehmer noted that as of YTD the department has spent about 16% of the budget.

The proposed trail corridor is nearly 11 miles in length, with the first 2.26 mile proposed segment starting at the intersection of Humboldt Street and Munzel Drive in Watertown heading east to River Road. The Jefferson County Parks Department is raising the necessary funds to construct the trail. The project will be phased, with the first phase costing approximately \$1,400,000. Jefferson County is attempting to raise \$420,000 in private funds to complete the project. Dear Property Owner,

The Rock Lake Improvement Association would like to thank you for granting access to your property along the ditch south and west of Miliala Shores channel in order to take measures to reduce sediment and phosphorus from entering Rock Lake.

While we hope to continue to implement most, if not all, the recommendations of UW - Madison and Montgomery Associates as outlined in their final reports, we are unable to do so at this time.

Not all property owners granted permission to access their property. Without their approval we are unable to file an application for a Wisconsin DNR Lake Protection grant that, if successful, would have provided the necessary funding to stabilize the ditch and/or restore the wetlands.

It is our intent to move forward, however, with the following recommendations:

- 1) retain the turbidity curtain in the channel
- 2) advocate nutrient management plan revision
- 3) promote storm water management practices
- 4) install vegetated buffer adjacent to row crops
- 5) take out box elders/other invasive species



SUBJECT: Notice of Noncompliance – Continuing Nitrate Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)

Violation

Dear Kevin Wiesmann:

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (Department) records indicate that Carlin Weld Co Park has violated the nitrate maximum contaminant level (MCL) based on sample result on 11 mg/L on May 28, 2015. This sample exceeds the 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L) MCL for nitrate as specified in chapter NR 809, Wis. Adm. Code.

As long as the water supplied by your system exceeds the 10 mg/L MCL for nitrate, you are required to demonstrate that the five conditions below are being met. If the Department finds any requirement not being met, escalated enforcement action will begin and you will be required to obtain a new low nitrate water supply or install treatment on the existing water supply.

Conditions of Approval:

At the discretion of the Department, section NR 809.11(3), Wis. Adm. Code allows nitrate levels above 10 mg/L, but not exceeding 20 mg/L, in a non-community water system. You may, therefore, continue to serve this water as long as you demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Department all of the following:

- 1. Such water will not be available to children under 6 months of age or any female who is or may become pregnant.
- 2. There will be continuous posting at all water outlets of the fact that nitrate levels exceed 10 mg/L and the potential health effects of exposure. In restaurants and taverns where tap water is served, a notice shall be posted at each table or in menus.
- 3. Local and state public health authorities will be notified annually of nitrate levels that exceed 10 mg/L.
- 4. A supply of low nitrate (containing less than 10 mg/L nitrate), bacteriologically safe drinking water shall be provided for any female who is or may become pregnant and infants under 6 months of age.
- 5. No adverse health effects will result. The Department has been advised by the Wisconsin Division of Public Health that there is evidence of an association between exposure to high nitrate levels in drinking water during the first weeks of pregnancy and certain birth defects. Females who are or may become pregnant should not consume this water.

Recommended Action:

The Wisconsin Division of Public Health recommends that all people avoid long-term consumption of water that has a nitrate level greater than 10 mg/L. To limit your liability and to provide a safe water supply for all of your

customers, the Department recommends that you evaluate available options for reducing nitrate to levels below 10 mg/L. These options might include construction of a replacement well, reconstruction of an existing well, treatment, or connection to a neighboring well that is properly constructed and provides low nitrate, bacteriologically safe water. Please contact me <u>before</u> undertaking any action to lower the nitrate concentration of your water.

Public Notification Requirements:

You must continue to post the previously supplied Public Notice and placards at all water outlets. If you need additional placards please contact me. The placards are also available in Spanish if you feel that would be appropriate for your facility.

Please keep in mind that failure to complete the required actions will result in additional violations and further enforcement action. Contact Holly Hisel at 920-262-8094 if you need additional assistance. I appreciate your cooperation in maintaining and providing a safe water supply.

Re: ROCK RIVER PUBLIC ACCESS - WATERTOWN LANDING

We own property (under the name of Judy Draeger) just south of this land and have experienced trespassing, careless garbage disposal, and excessive noise over the years by the users of this property. We don't believe the problems were caused by the members of the Watertown Outboarders, but by snowmobilers and others who did not have legal access to the boat club but used it because it was accessible from the river.

We do have concerns that having no access restrictions and allowing overnight camping is going to increase the amount of trespassers and garbage on our property as well as the noise from disrespectful people. In addition, we hear about drug use increasing in the area and can imagine this becoming a destination for illegal activities because of it's proximity to the freeway and town. It is isolated, but certainly not as much as it used to be.

We know that many small waysides have been closed over the years. We have heard the reasons for closing these waysides is because of vandalism, maintenance and the cost of monitoring them. We do not feel that this little landing is going to see much in the way of monitoring by police and it will be very tempting for illegal activities. You can see it from the freeway, but otherwise it is protected from view of the road. It will require someone driving down the driveway to actually see the park.

We realize that this will be a very nice little park for people to launch boats, fish, and picnic. We've actually had quite a few people asking us when it will be open. However, we urge you to not allow overnight camping. We urge you to restrict access by making this a day-use park only.
