# Land & Water Conservation Committee Minutes December 16, 2015

#### 1. Call to Order:

The monthly meeting was called to order by Matt Foelker at 8:03 am. Committee members Matthew Foelker (Chair), Ed Morse (Vice Chair), Peter Hartz (Secretary), Gregg Patrick (Member), and Frank Anfang (FSA Rep) were present. Also in attendance were Mark Watkins, Director, Land & Water Conservation Department (LWCD); and Kim Liakopoulos, LWCD.

#### 2. Roll Call (Establish a Quorum):

A quorum was established.

#### 3. Certification of Compliance with the Open Meetings Law:

It was determined that the committee was in compliance with the Open Meetings Law.

#### 4. Approval of the December Agenda:

The December agenda was reviewed by the committee members. No changes were proposed.

## 5. Approval of the November 18, 2015 Meeting Minutes:

Frank Anfang made a motion to approve the November 18, 2015 meeting minutes as written, Ed Morse seconded. Motion carried 5/0.

## 7. Citizen Comments:

There were no citizen comments.

#### 8. Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Report:

Since there is no NRCS presence in Jefferson County at this time, a report was unavailable.

## 9. Discussion and Possible Action on Participation with the Watertown Adaptive Management Program:

The City of Watertown met with Mark Watkins about an adaptive management program similar to what the City of Oconomowoc is trying to put in place. The City of Watertown is in the very early stages so Mark Watkins gave Watertown the information needed to contact Oconomowoc. Mark Watkins informed the committee that Jefferson County is equipped to help both Oconomowoc and Watertown although funding will be needed. The committee thinks Jefferson County should stay in contact with both Oconomowoc and Watertown in regard to this program. Jefferson County could benefit from being in the program from the start.

Gregg Patrick made a motion to assist Watertown in any way available, Pete Hartz seconded. Motion carried 5/0.

#### 10. Discussion and Possible Action on 2015 Cost Share Contract Carry Overs:

Mark Watkins discussed the cost share contract carry overs. See attached. Frank Anfang made a motion to accept the carry overs, Peter Hartz seconded. Motion carried 5/0.

#### 11. Discussion on Hoard's Dairyman Manure Pit:

Mark Watkins: As of 12/2/15 the pit was at 75% capacity and a leak was detected. The weekly contamination reports show a huge spike in contamination levels. Hoard's has been ordered to shut down the pit, empty it, and collect any outflow water. It will take Hoard's at least 21 days to empty and clean the pit. Hoards will have to start the inspection and repair all over. Mark Watkins will continue to follow the contamination reports and update the committee at future meetings.

1.	WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO CLAIM FP TAX CREDITS UNDER S. 71.613 STATS. OF \$5, \$7.50
	\$10 PER ACRE USING THE FC-A SCHEDULE

Farm landowners that are Wisconsin residents are eligible to claim Farmland Preservation (FP) tax credits if:

- The land is covered by a: certified <u>FP zoning ordinance</u>, agreement, or a modified agreement.
- The land is in agricultural use and produced \$6,000 in gross farm revenue the previous year or \$18,000 over the previous three years. Claimants renting their land can claim the tax credits based on gross farm revenue produced by the renter. The actual rent received by the landowner is not counted toward gross farm revenue. However, other payments received, such as payments for enrolling land in the federal Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), and other state and federal programs, can be used to meet the gross farm revenue requirement.
- The claimants is in compliance with the soil and water conservation standards incorporated
  into ATCP 50, Wis. Admin. Code, including being covered by a 590 Nutrient Management
  (NM) plan, on all land under common ownership, regardless of whether those acres are
  eligible for the credit. "Common ownership" exists when multiple parcels are owned by the
  same entity.
- □ A Certificate of Compliance issued by the county land conservation committee lists all of a claimant's tax parcels and includes a unique Certificate of Compliance number. Beginning with tax year 2016, a landowner claiming FP tax credits will enter their unique Certificate of Compliance number onto the FC-A Schedule prior to claiming the tax credit for the 2016 tax year. This certificate number is required by the Department of Revenue to show landowner compliance with all applicable soil and water conservation standards. The FC-A Schedule instructions will determine if the initial Certificate of Compliance is required to be attached and submitted with the FC-A Schedule.
  - A landowner with an agreement should always <u>attach their agreement</u> to the FC and FC-A Schedule.
  - The compliance obligations under a FP <u>agreement continue once the land is sold.</u> The
    agreement goes with the land obligating the new owner to continue to comply with the
    terms of the agreement, including compliance with the soil and water conservation
    standards. These obligations must be met, regardless of whether the new owner is eligible
    to claim the farmland preservation tax credit.
  - A landowner with an <u>agreement signed prior to 2002</u> is not required to have a Certificate of
    Compliance and will claim the FP tax credit using the Schedule FC. These landowners are
    required to follow the soil and water conservation standards in ATCP 50 Wis. Admin. Code
    at the time the agreement became effective. Prior to 2002, claimants were required to
    only meet soil erosion conservation standards.

#### 2. CONSERVATION COMPLIANCE

Farms are inspected for compliance with the soil and water conservation standards every four
years. The current standards required for compliance can be found in the model farm
inspection publication available at:

#### CONSERVATION COMPLIANCE CONTINUED

	CONSERVATION COMM ENANCE COMMISSES
	A landowner wishing to claim the Farmland Preservation Tax Credit for the first time after January 1, 2016, must comply with all the soil and water conservation standards listed in ATCP 50, Wis. Admin. Code prior to the county issuing a <i>Certificates of Compliance</i> .
	Counties working with a landowner to comply with the 2002 soil and water conservation standards have until December 31, 2016 to issue a <i>Certificate of Compliance</i> for the farm which meets the 2002 soil and water conservation standards. Counties will provide the landowner with a performance schedule to comply with the 2012 soil and water conservation standards before 2021. If the claimant demonstrates progress complying with the 2012 soil and water conservation standards, their <i>Certificate of Compliance</i> remains valid. The county should continue to monitor the NM plan by requesting a <i>NM Plan Checklist</i> each year from the farmer.
	The county may issue a <u>Notice of Noncompliance</u> for falling out of compliance with the soil and water conservation standards. If a <u>Notice of Noncompliance</u> is issued during the year, then the landowner is not eligible to claim the FP tax credit for that tax year. <u>Notice of Noncompliance</u> should be issued to the landowner in the same tax year in which they are found out of compliance.
	If the landowner is determined to be complying with the soil and water conservation standards, the county land conservation committee may issue a <u>Cancellation of the Notice of Noncompliance</u> for the landowner to resume claiming tax credits.
3.	OTHER ISSUES
	A landowner with land in multiply counties will need tax parcels from the counties in which they own land listed on the Certificate of Compliance. County conservation offices should share their compliance information and coordinate which county will conduct the farm inspection.
	Land under the Managed Forest Law (MFL) that is also under either FP zoning or a new/modified FP agreement is eligible for the tax credit using Schedule FC-A if the other minimum requirements, including gross farm revenue, state residency, and soil and water conservation standards compliance are met. Landowners with old FP agreements who must

• The landowner has 1 year to update their nutrient management plan to include these acres. In order to maintain eligibility for the tax credit, the landowner must be in compliance on all acres under common ownership, regardless of whether the landowner can claim tax credits on all of these acres.

use Schedule FC and who own land in MFL are not eligible to claim the tax credit on the MFL

- If the landowner has an <u>agreement</u> and the land is not under zoning, the landowner cannot claim on the new acres until they have a new agreement in place for those acres.
- If the landowner's new land is under zoning and the person has an agreement on other land, the landowner can claim on the new acres, but only at the \$7.50 per acre tax credit rate until they get an agreement in place on those new acres.
- The county should issue a new *Certificate of Compliance* to the landowner showing the eligibility of the additional land. The same unique *Certificate of Compliance* number will apply to the farm and the county will track the additional parcels.

#### **Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program**

Expiration of CREP agreements will begin September 30, 2016. Counties may want to start looking
into how this will affect workloads in the upcoming coming years and discuss with local CREP
partner agencies. CREP will likely offer a reenrollment option and counties might also consider
planning for landowner outreach to discuss reenrollment or other options for continuing conservation
on the ground. DATCP and FSA are working on CREP reenrollment guidance that will be available
in the coming months.

#### Soil and Water Resource Management Grants

 The 2017 Joint DATCP/DNR Nonpoint Source Grant Application was distributed to counties and other project cooperators in late January. Applications are due to Kim Carlson at <u>Kim.Carlson@wi.gov</u> before Friday, April 15<sup>th</sup>.

#### Land and Water Resource Management Plans

- The Land and Water Conservation Board met on February 2<sup>nd</sup> and recommended approval of the Shawano County and Kenosha County Land and Water Resource Management plans. The board also reviewed draft materials reflecting proposed changes to county Land and Water Resource Management annual work planning and reporting requirements.
- The 2015 annual activities report survey will be distributed on **Monday**, **February 15<sup>th</sup>**, with responses due to DATCP before **April 15<sup>th</sup>**. The survey will be administered using Survey Monkey, and counties should expect to receive an email including a link to access the survey questions.

## Farmland Preservation

- Landowners who are in compliance with the 2002 agricultural performance standards should be issued a Certificate of Compliance that includes a Certificate of Compliance <u>number</u> as soon as possible. Certificates of Compliance issued <u>now</u> must <u>all</u> include a certificate of compliance number as well. Certificates previously issued should also be assigned a certificate of compliance number, and the landowner should be notified of that number. Landowners wishing to claim the farmland preservation tax credit for calendar year 2016 will need that number when they file their 2016 tax forms. DATCP will provide a more detailed FAQ document soon to help answer additional questions.
- DATCP is now accepting AEA petitions for designation in 2016. Petition materials, including instructions and forms, are available online <a href="here">here</a>. Completed petitions are due on **April 29, 2016**. To view a recent webinar about the petition process, click <a href="here">here</a>.
- Farmland preservation staff contact local zoning authorities regarding required reporting of rezones. Zoning authorities must submit a report of lands zoned out of a certified farmland preservation zoning district to DATCP by March 1<sup>st</sup>. Failure to submit a report may result in DATCP withdrawal of certification of the farmland preservation zoning ordinance. - DATCP hosted six workshops for tax preparers throughout Wisconsin in January and early February

  <u>Conservation Stewardship Program</u> (CSP). NRCS accepts applications for CSP throughout the year, but producers should submit applications by March 31<sup>st</sup> to <u>USDA Service Centers</u> to ensure they are considered for enrollment in 2016. Participants with existing CSP contracts that will expire on December 31<sup>st</sup> have the option to renew their contracts for an additional 5 years if they agree to adopt additional activities to achieve higher levels of conservation on their lands. Applications to renew are also due by March 31<sup>st</sup>.
- Enrollment is now open for the USDA-FSA Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and ends on February 26<sup>th</sup>, 2016. Participants in CRP establish long-term grasses or trees to control soil erosion, improve water quality, and develop wildlife habitat on marginally productive agricultural lands.
