MINUTES

Criminal Justice Collaborating Council

March 23, 2016

1. Call to Order

Meeting was called to order by Judge Randy Koschnick at 12:00 p.m.

2. Roll Call

Members present: J. Blair Ward, Corporation Counsel; Ben Wehmeier, County Administrator; Randy Koschnick, Circuit Court Judge; Susan Happ, District Attorney, Denis Sorensen, City of Waterloo Police Chief, Martin Lastrilla, Department of Corrections, John David, Mayor of Watertown, Jim Schroeder, County Board Chair, Brent Ruehlow for Kathi Cauley, Human Services Director; Lynn Forseth, Jefferson County Literacy Council Director; and Sheriff Paul Milbrath.

3. Certification of compliance with Open Meetings Law Requirements

6. Update on JCATC outcomes YTD 2016 to date (James Feldman)

Reports were provided for the Council to review. Feldman went through the reports. He stated there were 43 clients in Jefferson County of which 83% were compliant. There were 9 Jefferson ATC (SCRAM) of which 89% were compliant.

Feldman went through the Treatment Court, there were 38 since the program start, 3 were last month. There were 2 risk assessments done. There are 4 that are awaiting admission and 7 graduates from the program. Currently there are 15 caseloads, 3 SCRAM x and 4 discharges. Next month or so there will be 2 more graduates.

Schroeder talked about this past graduation and that the Lt. Governor was there to speak and many attended. The 4 graduates talked which they were short and to the point that this is a valuable program and they were thankful.

Wehmeier talked about the next grant which will be competitive. The state is adding about \$2 million in funding statewide. He asked the Committee to start thinking of ideas to help bring in grant dollars. The deadline for the grant is June 30, 2016.

Compliance summary reports on SCRAM and Remote Breath were provided for the Council to review. No action taken.

• Lafollette Center Update

Ruehlow stated there is about 45% are reincarcerated inmates. About half of them are with new charges. About 44% are drug and alcohol related with a breakdown of: 5% alcohol, 19%

marijuana, 10% cocaine and 14% heroin. Males were 73% and females 27%. About 32% were between the ages of 24-30. Weapons were present about 2% of the time.

No action taken.

9. Coordination with Recidivism Council and other agencies

Forseth stated that they had met in the morning with 4 guest speakers. She stated there was talk about training sessions for Certified Recover Life Coaches. They would be there to provide hand holding and support. She stated that eventually this program will be brought to this committee.

10. Discussion on heroin/opiates

Schroeder talked about attending the ICC (Intercounty Coordinating Committee) with a presentation by Sauk County and how they are staying ahead on attacking this issue in their county. They looked at the barriers and worked on figuring out how to break down those barriers. They provide a doctor in every community. They went to the drug companies to get discounts provided. They worked on a detailed action plan in each community. They emphasized the fact that it is important that the Drug Task force is in constant communication with Human Services. Training for Officers is important. Making sure the program provides individuals with the infrastructure and help that is needed. Happ talked about a municipality that has been working on this also and made it a point that the Police department is the first point of contact and more time is taken during booking to ask questions and possibly handing it off to the Human Services when needed.

Discussion took place on what would or could a program look like here and removing all the obstacles and excuses from the individual that wants to get help.

Ruehlow handed out a brochure that Human Services produced. He will send out the brochure as a PDF to the committee and the local police departments. Judge Koschnick stated that we could imitate some of Sauk County for this program and to have the brochure available in all the squads.

Schroeder state the brochure was more towards the professional and maybe look at having one more for the user.
