# 8. Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Report:

NRCS didn't attend the meeting therefore a report was unavailable. Jurcek notified the committee that the NRCS District Conservationist for Jefferson & Rock Counties will be David Gundlach, from Rock County, starting October 1, 2021. NRCS plans to hire a Senior Soil Conservationist for Jefferson County sometime in 2021.

# 9. Discussion on Departmental Updates:

The county farm tile drain repair is complete. The Wisconsin Land & Water Southern Area Association regional meeting will be 5/27/2021 on Zoom. FPP spot check of the north east quadrant will begin the last week of May. Susan Graham, Water Resources Management Specialist for the WI DNR is retiring this summer. Cicero & Marisa Ulman will be performing an aquatic plant survey on Lower Spring Lake prior to a chemical treatment for invasive species.

### **Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP)**

- DATCP requests that LCD's work with DATCP staff to perform monitoring visits on perpetual easements with expired FSA CRP1 contracts. DATCP hired an intern, Alec Martin, starting May 23, 2021 to assist LCD's with completing the field assessment. These visits are essential for benchmarking the status of the conservation practice and identifying and communicating to landowners any issues on the site prior to them becoming severe. Alec is eager to assist and LCD's should contact him via email (alec.martin@wisconsin.gov) or phone as soon as possible to arrange a time to do the site visits.
- Virtual CREP 101 Training is offered by DATCP to all CREP counties. The training is offered per LCD request and
  reviews program requirements, landowner engagement, agency partnership coordination and county administrative

# **Budget Blueprint: Clean Drinking Water and Resilient Farms by 2030**

To address the water quality challenges many Wisconsin families face, we must commit to long-term solutions and bold action. Over the next decade, we need to dedicate significant financial investments to provide clean drinking water for affected residents, and appropriate incentives for farmers to protect water quality.

#### **ENSURING CLEAN DRINKING WATER**

**Well contamination:** Offer every family that has a nitrate-contaminated well the opportunity to access funds for well replacement or whole home filtration. Investment: \$15 million per year for 10 years.

**Well testing:** Provide grants for county-led programs or direct state assistance that prioritizes testing for low-income households and high-risk areas. Investment: \$6.5 million per year ongoing.

#### SUPPORTING CURRENT CONSERVATION EFFORTS AND FOSTERING INNOVATION

**County conservation staff:** Increase professional staff capacity to support private landowner management goals, implement conservation standards and improve water quality. Investment: \$17.9 million per year ongoing.

**Farmland preservation:** Support and increase Farmland Preservation Program tax credits as laid out in an existing bipartisan bill. Investment: \$21.4 million per year ongoing.

**Nitrate pollution prevention:** Expand on the concept of an already proposed on-farm nitrogen optimization pilot program to address nitrate contamination with increased funding and the addition of a pay-for-performance program. Investment: \$10 million per year ongoing.

**Investing in conservation science:** Create a hydrogeologist position at the University of Wisconsin Extension focused on developing groundwater mapping resources as proposed in an earlier bill, and have the state continue depth-to-bedrock mapping in southwestern Wisconsin similar to that conducted in the northeastern part of the state. Investment: \$550,000 over the biennium.

**Increasing cover crops:** Create a crop insurance premium rebate program to incentivize planting cover crops. Similar programs in other states have fully subscribed within days of their launch. Investment: \$500,000 per year ongoing.

Addressing climate change: Take a variety of opportunities to address climate change in agriculture.

- Create a pilot program to study the feasibility of a carbon market covering the state, including providing grants to farmers and farmer-led groups that participate. Investment: \$370,000 over the biennium.
- Continue to support farmer-led watershed conservation groups and expand the focus to carbon sequestration in farm practices, and greenhouse gas mitigation. Investment: \$2 million over the biennium.
- Avoid conversion of natural working lands by expanding the Farmland Preservation Program and creating a state/federal working group to investigate addition of grasslands to use value assessment.
- Prioritize managed grazing livestock production systems by creating a statewide grazing education grant program and assist farmers who incorporate regenerative agricultural practices. Investment: \$640,000 over the biennium









# **Guiding Policy Principles for Clean Water and Resilient Farms**

# **Ensuring clean drinking water**

It was good to see a renewed emphasis on this topic during the last legislative session. While the recommendations of the Speaker's Task Force on Water Quality were a good start, we need to see a much bigger investment in clean drinking water to ensure people can trust the water coming from their tap. We need to expand well testing and funding for well replacement and treatment. We also need more groundwater mapping to help understand the sources of contamination, which include both agriculture and septic systems. This effort will require a significant financial investment, but some of it could be offset by revenue from higher well, septic and other permits.

# **Reimagining the CAFO program**

Wisconsin needs a more effective farm permitting system. To realize a future where all farms are successful while also meeting conservation standards, the program needs more resources to handle permitting, provide assistance to farmers and ensure compliance. For the good of farms and the environment, we would benefit from bringing more farms into the CAFO permitting process, but that will require the program to be much more efficient. This means making systemic changes to how the current program operates and expecting improved engagement from both the regulators and the regulated community.

# Supporting current conservation efforts and fostering innovation

Many farmers and outside groups are already engaged in worthwhile conservation efforts. We should support these efforts, such as the current farmer-led watershed model. At the same time, we need to do more to measure these groups' success and hold them accountable for the public resources they receive. There are also innovative thinkers with new ideas to improve agriculture's environmental impact. To foster innovation, we need to ensure regulatory clarity to allow for experimentation. We can also help by funding relevant research into these technologies and differing farm techniques.

### Improving Wisconsin's non-point program

Almost 20 years ago, Wisconsin created its current program for addressing non-point pollution from agricultural sources, but those rules have still never been fully implemented and the program has never been properly funded. Wisconsin should move toward holding all farms accountable for these standards regardless of size, type and availability of cost-share money. This makes sense for the environment, but it is also fairer for farms. This change may need to be phased in over time or be associated with certain incentives, but we need to move in that direction now. To help with this change, it is even more important that county land and water efforts are properly funded. That includes more money for staffing and cost share as non-compliant farms adapt.

# Authorizing the Application and Implementation of a Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Early Detection Response Grant

# Executive Summary

Phragmites is a non-native, invasive grass that grows in wetlands. There is a population of Phragmites of about 2 acres growing along the Rock River north of Jefferson. Due to the proximity of the Phragmites to the Rock River and County Highway N, it is very likely to spread to other areas and have negative ecological impacts if not managed. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has an Early Detection Response Grant to manage Phragmites and other aquatic invasive species due to the effort needed to properly control invasive species. This project will greatly benefit the area and align well with both the statewide and Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department's aquatic invasive species management and prevention goals. This resolution authorizes the Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department to apply for, and if awarded, to accept grant funds of approximately \$5,700.00 for the purpose of managing Phragmites in Jefferson County. The Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Committee considered this resolution at its meeting on June 16, 2021 and recommended forwarding to the County Board for approval.

WHEREAS, the Executive Summary is incorporated into this resolution, and

WHEREAS, the Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department (LWCD) is interested in obtaining a cost-share grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for the purpose of eradicating an approximately 2 acre stand of the invasive wetland grass Phragmites, and

WHEREAS, the Jefferson County LWCD attests to the validity and veracity of the statements and representations contained in the grant application, and

WHEREAS, a grant agreement will be entered into between Jefferson County and the Wisconsin DNR to carry out the project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors that the Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department will meet the financial obligations necessary to fully and satisfactorily complete the project and hereby authorizes and empowers the Land and Water Conservation Department Director to submit the following documents to the Wisconsin DNR for financial assistance that may be available:

- 1. Sign and submit the required grant application.
- 2. Enter into a grant agreement with the DNR.
- 3. Submit quarterly and/or final reports to the DNR to satisfy the grant agreement, as appropriate.
- 4. Submit reimbursement request(s) to the DNR no later than the date specified in the grant agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department will comply with all local, state and federal laws, rules, regulations and ordinances relating to this project and the cost-share agreement.

Fiscal Note: There will be no fiscal impact. The total grant amount is estimated to be \$5,700 which will cover the cost of treating the Phragmites and reseeding with native plantings. The landowner has covered the required matching funds (\$2,000). The LWCD staff time will be covered by an existing DNR Lake Protection and Monitoring Network grant.

### **Phragmites Grant Application Resolution - Background**

Phragmites is a non-native, invasive grass that grows in wetlands. There is a population of Phragmites of about 2 acres growing along the Rock River north of Jefferson. This spring, the property owner burned the Phragmites to help control it. The landowner wishes to work with the state/county to chemically treat any Phragmites plants that reemerge and then reseed the area with native vegetation to prevent the Phragmites from reestablishing.

This patch of Phragmites is one of only seven points of verified Phragmites populations in Jefferson County. The location of this patch is ideal for enabling the species to spread as it is bordered by County Highway N (the landowner has seen people cut the plant to bring home) and the Rock River (the river can carry the plant to new locations). Also nearby is the Glacial Drumlin Trail and a public boat launch.

We would like to take the initiative to treat this pioneering population due to the population's recent establishment, it is incredibly likely to spread due to proximity to the highway and river, and the willing landowner who has already taken initiative and paid out of pocket to burn the area.

The Jefferson County LWCD would apply for and administer the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resource's Early Detection and Response grant on behalf of the landowner. This project would be of great benefit to the area and align well with both the statewide and LWCD's aquatic invasive species management and prevention goals.

The cost of the project is \$5,700 and includes the costs of applying herbicides and reseeding. The landowner is contributing \$2,000 to the total project (the required matching funds for the grant) which involved burning of the site in the spring. The project will commence in the fall of 2021 and is anticipated to be completed in the spring of 2023. The LWCD staff time spent on this project will be covered by the existing DNR Lake Protection and Monitoring Network grant received earlier this year.
