# Land & Water Conservation Committee Minutes June 16, 2021

### 1. Call to Order:

The monthly meeting was called to order by Matt Foelker at 8:30 am. Also in attendance were Patricia Cicero, Director, Land & Water Conservation Department (LWCD); Kim Liakopoulos, LWCD; and Marisa Ulman, LWCD. Margaret Burlingham (PACE Rep) was present via Zoom.

- 2. Roll Call (Establish a Quorum):

A quorum was established.

- Certification of Compliance with the Open Meetings Law: It was determined that the committee was in compliance with the Open Meetings Law.
- 4. Review of the June Agenda:

The June agenda was reviewed by the committee members. No changes were proposed.

# 5. Approval of the May 19, 2021 Meeting Minutes:

Herbst made a motion to approve the May 19, 2021 meeting minutes as written, Kannard seconded. Motion passed 6/0.

8. Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Report: NRCS didn't attend the meeting therefore a report was unavailable.

# 9. Discussion on State and County Budget Process:

Cicero discussed the State and County Budget process with the committee.

For County Conservation Staff, DATCP requested a permanent base of \$13 million dollars. The State Joint Finance Committee approved \$11,030,000 for 2022 and \$11,280,000 for 2023. The next steps are legislative action and the Governor's approval.

The County Finance Committee budget meetings begin 9/13/2021. The preliminary budget will be presented to the County Board 10/12/2021.

#### 10. Discussion on Departmental Updates:

Farmland Preservation Program spot check of the north east quadrant will be finished at the end of the week, Cicero is working with Nancy Lannert & Joe Strupp to draft a cover crop and pasture establishment cost share contract, and the transect survey is complete.

Liakopoulos gave an overview of the tree sale program report and answered Committee questions.

12. Discussion and Possible Action on Resolution to Authorize the Application and Implementation of a Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Early Detection Response Grant:

Ulman is working with a landowner to mitigate invasive phragmites on two acres in the County. The grant will provide the restoration funds to remove this troublesome plant.

Burlingham made a motion to forward the grant to the County Board for approval, Kannard seconded. Motion passed 7/0.

Kannard made a motion to accept the notice, Christensen seconded. Motion passed 7/0.

#### Farmland Preservation Program and Agricultural Enterprise Areas

• The 2021 Agricultural Enterprise Area petition period is quickly coming to a close. Petitions are due by August 2, 2021. Any interested petitioners who have not yet set up a petition interview should contact Wednesday Jordan at wednesday.jordan@wisconsin.gov. The application, instructions, and examples of successful petitions are available on the Petitioning for AEA Designation at the following <u>link</u>.

#### Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP)

- FSA Washington reopened CREP for enrollment on June 14th, 2021 under continuous sign-up 55 (FFY2021) and will be open for enrollment and reenrollment until Aug 6, 2021. As part of the reopening FSA reevaluated payment rates and made the following updates: change from 3 to 5 soil rental rates per county, adjusted soil productivity index (SPI) from 50-100% to 50-150% of county rental rate and added a one-time 10% inflationary adjustment of SRR for lifetime of contract that applies to both cropland and marginal pastureland. The new rental rates will likely result in an increase, potentially significant, in annual rental and incentive payments to landowners for CREP agreements. An email from DATCP was sent to each CREP county on June 17, 2021 with further details regarding the payment changes and enrollment deadlines for this year.
- DATCP requests that LCD's work with DATCP staff to perform monitoring visits on perpetual easements with expired FSA CRP1 contracts. DATCP hired an intern, Alec Martin, to assist LCD's with completing the field assessment. These visits are essential for benchmarking the status of the conservation practices and identifying and communicating to landowners any issues on the site prior to them becoming severe. Alec is eager to assist, but only available until the end of August, 2021. LCD's should contact Alec via email (alec.martin@wisconsin.gov) or phone as soon as possible to arrange a time to do the site visits.
- Virtual CREP 101 Training is offered by DATCP to all CREP counties. The training is offered per LCD request and

reviews program requirements, landowner engagement, agency partnership coordination and county administrative processes. All local agency partners are invited to attend and the training is valuable to both new and seasoned local CREP staff. #### Agricultural Impact Statement (AIS) Program

- The AIS program is currently drafting an AIS for Xcel Energy's proposed relocation of a high voltage electric transmission line in Ashland and Iron Counties. The AIS program is actively reaching out to affected agricultural landowners and consulting with impacted units of government regarding the project.

# Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department Annual Report July 2020 - June 2021

The purpose of the Land and Water Conservation Department (LWCD) is to provide for the conservation of soil and water resources of Jefferson County. The LWCD is charged with administering State Statutes and County ordinances that conserve and protect our natural resources.

# **Department Funding**

- Department of Agriculture staffing grant = \$151,690 in 2021
- Department of Natural Resources Lake Monitoring & Protection Network staff grant = \$13,003
- County Farm rental = \$100,427 in 2021
- Department of Agriculture funding = \$33,750 in 2021 to assist landowners with conservation practice installation and \$12,000 in 2021 to assist landowners with nutrient management plan development
- Multi-Discharger Variance Program funding to be used on new cover crop and pasture establishment program = \$11,129 from 2020 and \$20,777 from 2021
- Farmland Preservation Program fees = approximately \$16,500 per year
- Tree Program = approximately \$7,800 per year
- Department of Natural Resources (DNR) grant to fund lake/river practices = \$2,200 total for 2021 of which \$200 can be used for staffing costs
- Non-Metallic Mining Reclamation = \$10,145 in 2021 annual permitting fees. \$900 in new plan review fees in 2021
- Various permits and fees generate approximately \$2,000 per year

# Land and Water Resources Management Plan

This plan is required by the Department Agricultural, Trade and Consumer Protection for the LWCD to be eligible to receive staffing grants and conservation practice funding. Updated in 2021, the plan lays out the mission, goals, and work plan for the LWCD. The following conservation practices have been installed with the funding during the last 3 years.

- 2019 projects: 2 manure storage closures, 1 well closure
- 2020 projects: 1 grassed waterway (563 ft), 2 manure storage closures, 1 well closure, and 1 shoreline stabilization (70 ft)
- 2021 projects to date: 1 nutrient management plan (163 acres)

# Cover Crop and Pasture Establishment Cost-Share Program

New in 2021, the LWCD created a cover crop and pasture establishment cost-share program that is funded by the Multi-Discharger Variance Program. Contracts will be initiated starting in August 2021.

### **Farmland Preservation Program**

The Wisconsin Farmland Preservation Program (FPP) offers farm owners a tax credit for protecting our State's soil and water resources. Landowners receive credit on their Wisconsin income taxes in exchange for compliance with the State conservation standards. LWCD works with landowners and producers to ensure they meet the requirements of the program. The tax credit is calculated as a flat, per acre rate. In Jefferson County, most landowners receive \$7.50 per acre. Landowners located in an Ag Enterprise Area (AEA) can sign a 15 year agreement with the State and receive \$10.00 per acre. An AEA is created when landowners join together to petition the State to create an area dedicated to long term agricultural use. Jefferson County has one AEA located in parts of Palmyra and Sullivan Townships.

- 613 total FPP participants covering a total of 106,286 acres
- 6 AEA agreements covering 548.39 acres
- \$798,516 total tax relief
- Maintained and further developed FPP landowner database with nearly 3,600 parcels
- Maintained and enhanced tools to generate required Certificates of Compliance

# **Agricultural Performance Standards**

State law (NR 151) identifies minimum standards that agricultural producers must follow. These rules regulate manure management and require the use of soil conservation and nutrient management plans. LWCD works with producers to help them achieve compliance with the laws.

- Received nutrient management plan check lists for 1,048 landowners covering 108,295 acres
- Maintained and updated approximately 5,600 parcel records to track compliance

# **Nutrient Management and Farmer Education Classes**

State law (NR151.07) and the Farmland Preservation Program require that all cropland where nutrients are applied be covered by a nutrient management plan. These plans must be updated each year to account for crop rotation and changes in fertilization. LWCD offers classes to teach farmers how to write and update their plans.

• 2 classes, 8 pupils (less than normal due to Covid)

# **Livestock Siting**

Under State law (ATCP 51) and the Jefferson County Zoning Ordinance, livestock producers who expand their animal numbers over 150 animal units must complete an application and worksheets. LWCD ensures these materials are complete and meet state standards before the farms can apply for a conditional use permit through the Zoning Department. There is an amendment process when changes are made but livestock numbers stay under the permitted levels.

• 25 farms in the County that have livestock siting conditional use permits

# **Transect Survey**

Annual survey in which cropping and tillage systems data is acquired at over 786 observation points. Data and calculations for 2021 from the points include the following:

- Crops: 47% corn, 25% soybeans, 16% hay/alfalfa, 6% small grains (wheat, oat, etc.), and 4% fallow
- Tillage: 48% chisel/disc system, <25% no-till, 22% reduced tillage (chisel with no disc)
- Residue levels on cropped acres: 43% had ≥50% residue, 35% has <30% residue
- Tolerable soil loss: 70% of cropped acres were at or below tolerable soil loss.

### **Tree Program**

LWCD administers an annual tree and shrub sale for citizens and offers tree planters and sprayers for rent.

• 2020/2021 sale offered 8 species with 4,800 trees/shrubs sold

# **Geographic Information Systems**


LWCD provides customized mapping and geo-analytical services for both internal and external customers and partners.

- Collaborated with the Land Information Department on modernizing land records and associated data sets.
- Maintained and updated various data sets for both the Parks and Zoning Departments.
- Assisted with updating Drainage District landowner listings and boundary mapping.
- Published and updated county internet map services and server for mapping applications.
- Maintained and enhanced field mapping tools for both the Parks and Zoning Departments.
- Utilized GPS and drone equipment for localized field mapping projects.

### **Agricultural Conservation Easement Program**

Assist landowners with the process and documentation of conservation easement applications to protect agricultural land from development. Work includes securing grant funding, completing land transactions, and annual monitoring and reporting.


- Since the beginning of the program: 5 donated easements and 4 purchased easements totaling over 1,000 acres on 34 tax parcels.
- Each easement property is inspected annually by LWCD staff.
- Provided mapping for applications and monitoring requirements.
- NRCS grant funding secured for one additional future acquisition in 2021.
- A partnership with American Farmland Trust successfully resulted in NRCS funds for future acquisitions in the next 5 years.



# Non-Metallic Mining Reclamation Permitting

According to State law (NR 135) and the Jefferson County Zoning Ordinance, non-metallic mines must have a permit to extract materials and ensure subsequent reclamation of mined land. LWCD ensures the mines and the reclamation plans meet standards.

- LWCD inspected 33 sites including 23 active, 3 reclaimed, 2 with revoked permits, and 5 exempt sites.
- Maintained and updated data related to nonmetallic mining permits.
- Reviewed and held public hearing for one new permit application.



# Water Resource Planning and Protection

Plan and implement projects in partnership with local resource organizations and municipalities to work on protecting and improving water resources including collecting data, educating the public, developing management plans, and implementing conservation practices.

- 17 shoreland visits to provide expert advice and assistance on Blue Spring Lake, Lake Koshkonong, Lake Ripley, Rock Lake, and the Rock River.
- Produced maps with various data for water resource groups.
- Reviewed shoreland restoration plans for the Zoning Department, including creating a rain garden implementation plan required as mitigation for a shoreline disturbance.
- Provided expertise on shoreline restoration projects including Rock River Landing and another project on the Rock River that involves multiple state and local partners.

# Surface Water Quality Monitoring

Staff trains, equips, and supports citizens who monitor lakes and streams. Results are tracked and shared with partners and citizens. In the last year, the following was accomplished:

- 4 stream sampling and 1 lake sampling training events
- 6 lakes were monitored
- 17 stream sites were monitored

# **Invasive Species Management**

For 2021 (Jan 1 - Dec 31), Jefferson County received a DNR grant to fund additional invasive species work. This has enabled staff to expand the breadth and diversity of invasive species management and control.

- Worked collaboratively with Highway Department to inform them about best management practices, control techniques, and decontamination protocols relating to invasive species.
- Established relationship with the City of Lake Mills to work on an initial invasive species action plan and to assist in managing existing invasive species populations.

- Identified 2 new populations of a DNR regulated prohibited species in the county and 10 additional locations of DNR regulated restricted species.
- Implemented programs to educate the public on preventing aquatic invasive species, including assisting the Town and City of Lake Mills with Clean Boats, Clean Waters Program grants.
- Worked on an early detection and response grant to manage a pioneering Phragmites population.
- Partnered with UW-EX to monitor and collect beetles at a rearing site to use for controlling purple loosestrife populations.
- Produced press releases and social media posts relating to local invasive species education.
- Participated in statewide education events and meetings as the county's aquatic invasive species coordinator.

# **Other Programs and Projects**

- Work on the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program to assist landowners with implementing stream buffers, grassed waterways and wetland restorations.
- Implement drone technology to assist with projects including field monitoring and mapping, preconstruction planning, and administration of regulations.
- Develop, customize, and maintain applications for data tracking of LWCD programs. This enables us to do required reporting to State departments.
- Serve as a pass-through for funds in both the Wildlife Damage Abatement Program (reimburses farmers for crop loss) and the Deer and Turkey Donation Program (meat supplied to food pantries).

# **Steps for Cost-Sharing**

- Fill out application available to LWCD office
- LWCD ranks projects
- Successful applicants will be contacted
- Contract between LWCD and producer will be signed
- Plans will be developed according to standards
- If producer is interested, then they can arrange up to 2 site visits with cover crop mentor during the life of the cover crop practice
- Practice is established
- LWCD or practice planner certified that practice was installed/ maintained according to standards
- Producer pays all related bill in full and provides proof of payment to LWCD
- LWCD pays the contracted flat-rate to the producer
- Practice is maintained according to plans

Jefferson County Land & Water Conservation Department

Cover Crop & Pasture Establishment Cost-Share Program



The Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department (LWCD) has funding available to cost-share the planting of cover crops and pasture establishment. Producers interested in cost-sharing for either practice should complete an application. Each application will be ranked based on environmental benefit and priority watersheds. Once an application is approved for funding, the LWCD will contact the producer to sign a required contract. No work can begin on the practice until the contract is completed.

# **Cover Crops**

A cover crop is growing a crop of grass, small grain, or legumes primarily for seasonal soil protection and soil improvement. This practice is used to control erosion, add fertility and organic material to the soil, improve soil tilth, increase infiltration and aeration of the soil, and improve overall soil health. The practice is also used to increase populations of bees for pollination purposes. Cover and green manure crops have beneficial effects on water quantity and quality. Cover crops have a filtering effect on movement of sediment, pathogens, and dissolved and sedimentattached pollutants.

Operation and maintenance of cover crops include: controlling weeds by mowing or by using other pest management techniques, and managing for the efficient use of soil moisture by selecting water-efficient plant species and terminating the cover crop before excessive transpiration. Use of the cover crop as a green manure crop to cycle nutrients will impact when to terminate the cover to match release of nutrient with uptake by the following cash crop.

Jefferson County LWCD will pay a flat rate of \$25 per acre of crop ground planted to cover crops. For each producer, there is a maximum enrollment of 100 acres per year and a maximum of 4 years (nonconsecutive) of eligibility. There is also an opportunity to work with a local and experienced cover crop mentor. Jefferson County will pay an approved mentor \$100 per visit with up to two visits per contract.

# **Pasture Establishment**

This practice applies to all lands suitable to the establishment of annual, biennial and perennial species for forage or biomass production. Establishing adapted and/or compatible species, varieties, or cultivars of herbaceous species suitable for pasture, hay, or biomass production. This practice does not apply to the establishment of annually planted and harvested grain, fiber, or oilseed crops. This practice may be applied as part of a conservation management system to reduce soil erosion and improve soil and water quality.

Jefferson County LWCD will pay a flat rate of \$125 per acre with a 40 acre maximum to convert land planted in row crops to pasture. The 40 acres can be split over a number of years and contracts. Producers receiving costsharing are required to maintain the pasture for a minimum of five years. Assistance is available to help you plan your project.
