The most recent statement of revenues and expenditures was distributed.



Conservation Engineering

- As previously mentioned, the revised NRCS Conservation Practice Standards (CPS) for streambank protection and restoration have been released. Producer-Led Grants

- The latest round of Producer-Led Watershed Protection Grants has been awarded to 36 farmer-led groups to work with other farmers and conservation organizations to address soil and water issues specific to their local watersheds.
- Seven of the groups are first-time recipients. Together, the 36 groups will receive the full \$1 million included in the state budget. Grants range from \$3,250 to \$40,000 for conservation practice incentives, education and outreach, on-farm demonstrations, and water quality testing and monitoring efforts.
- Requests for 2022 totaled nearly \$1.2 million.
- The Producer-Led Grants Annual workshop will be held on February 23rd at the Central Wisconsin Convention and Expo Center in Rothschild, WI taking place the day before the WI Cover Crop Conference. At least one farmer and collaborator from each group are encouraged to attend. The workshop will be recorded for later viewing for individuals unable to attend the in-person event. RESOLUTION NO. 2021-

Amending the 2022 Land and Water Conservation Department Budget

Executive Summary

The Jefferson County Soil Builders is a new group in Jefferson County whose mission is to enhance water quality and natural resources through education, collaboration and improved farming practices. They want to inspire farmers to keep soil in place, nutrients in the field, and waters clean.

In 2021, the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department and the Jefferson County Soil Builders. The purpose of that MOU was to establish a partnership between the two entities. It also set forth the responsibilities of each entity on a future Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Producer-Led Watershed Protection Grant. The MOU states that the Land and Water Conservation Department's role will include being the fiscal manager and collaborator by assisting with identification of projects and goals, communications, public relations, workshop logistics, and technical expertise. The Land and Water Conservation Department also will assist with conservation practice implementation.

In January 2022, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection approved a grant award to the Jefferson County Soil Builders. As the fiscal agent, the Land and Water Conservation Department is identified as the recipient of these funds. The Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Committee approved this resolution at its February 16, 2022 meeting, and recommended forwarding to the County Board for approval.

WHEREAS, the Executive Summary is incorporated into this resolution, and

WHEREAS, the Jefferson County Soil Builders applied for funds through the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Producer-Led Watershed Protection Grant to implement conservation practices, host field days and workshops, and conduct cover crop research, and

WHEREAS, the work set forth in the Jefferson County Soil Builders grant aligns with the goals, objectives, and activities of the Jefferson County Land and Water Resources Management Plan as well as the Jefferson County Comprehensive Plan, and

WHEREAS, the Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department and the Jefferson County Soil Builders entered into a Memorandum of Understanding approved by the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors that names the Land and Water Conservation Department as a collaborator and fiscal agent for grants, and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection awarded a Producer-Led Watershed Protection Grant for \$18,522 to the JCSB, and

WHEREAS, the Board of the Rock Lake Improvement Association voted to donate \$1,000 to the JCSB for use in implementing their grant, and

WHEREAS, a farmer who is part of the Jefferson County Soil Builders has pledged to donate \$2,000 to the Jefferson County Soil Builders for use in implementing their grant.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the amendment of the 2022 Land and Water Conservation Department budget to include \$21,522 for the implementation of the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection grant.

Fiscal Note: This is a budget amendment that increases revenue and expenditure by \$21,522. This resolution authorizes the County Finance Director to make the budget adjustments necessary to enact this resolution. As a budget amendment, County Board approval requires a two-thirds vote of the entire membership of the County Board (20 members of the 30-member County Board must vote in favor of the budget amendment).
