## Land & Water Conservation Committee Minutes December 21, 2022

#### 1. Call to Order:

The monthly meeting was called to order by Matt Foelker at 8:30 am. Committee Members Matt Foelker (Chair) (UW), Walt Christensen (Vice-Chair), Dan Herbst (UW) (via Zoom), Meg Turville-Heitz, Kirsten Jurcek (FSA), and Margaret Burlingham (PACE), were present. Also in attendance were Patricia Cicero, Director, Land & Water Conservation Department (LWCD); Kim Liakopoulos, LWCD; Joe Strupp, LWCD; and Dave Hoffman, LWCD (via Zoom). Cassie Richardson was excused.

• Others in Attendance: Jordan Schuler, Regional Crop Educator, UW Extension, and Anita Martin

#### 2. Roll Call (Establish a Quorum):

A quorum was established.

#### 3. Certification of Compliance with the Open Meetings Law:

It was determined that the committee was in compliance with the Open Meetings Law.

#### 4. Review of the December Agenda:

The December agenda was reviewed by the committee members. No changes were proposed.

#### 5. Approval of the November 16, 2022 Meeting Minutes:

Turville-Heitz made a motion to approve the November 16, 2022 meeting minutes as written, Christensen seconded. Motion passed 6/0.

#### 6. Public Comment:

There were no comments.

#### 7. Communications:

• Department of Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection December 2022 Report.

#### 8. Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Report:

NRCS did not attend the meeting therefore a report was unavailable.

#### 9. Introduction of Jordan Schuler, Regional Crop Educator, and Alison Pfau, Regional Dairy Educator:

Pfau was unable to attend. Cicero introduced Schuler to the committee. Schuler talked about the work that she has been doing with UW Extension, DNR and NRCS.

#### 10. Discussion on Departmental Updates:

The 2023 Multi Discharger Variance (MDV) grant has been applied for. Cicero, Strupp, the Parks department, and the renter of the County farm met regarding removal of dead ash trees adjacent to the field. A larger setback from the Health Department/Human Services parking lot was also discussed to accommodate lawn maintenance. Cicero met the USDA and Dane County about potentially participating in a Watershed Protection Program for Koshkonong Creek. The details are still being worked out. Strupp and Hoffman are monitoring cover crops and getting the contracts ready for payment. The Finance

Committee approved the use of ARPA funds for the ground water study. County board approved a budget amendment for the 2023 LWCD budget to accommodate this change. The tree sale is going well. Three species (30 bundles) are all that remains.

#### 11. Discussion on Manure Complaint Report:

Cicero and Strupp discussed the manure complaint report and answered committee questions.

- **12.** Discussion on Producer-Led Groups: Jefferson County Soil Builders (JCSB) & Rock River Regenerative Graziers (R3G): JCSB & R3G hosted a workshop 12/01/22 at UW Whitewater. Cicero has been contacted by the Jefferson County newspaper regarding agriculture articles. Schuler is available to assist with the articles. The Nature Conservancy will be gifting \$10,000 to both JCSB and R3G in 2023. The producer-led groups will meet to discuss the best way to use the money.
- **13.** Discussion and Possible Action on Notices of Noncompliance Farmland Preservation Program (FPP): There were no notices.
- **14. Discussion and Possible Action on Cancellation of Notices of Noncompliance FPP:**There were no cancellations.
- **15.** Discussion and Possible Action on Purchase of Agriculture Conservation Easement (PACE) Applications & Baseline Documentation: There are no new applications currently. The Committee discussed resolution no. 2008-15 which aims to establish a mechanism to fund farmland conservation easements.

#### 4. Review of Agenda

#### 5. Public Comment

The following members of the public addressed the joint committee on the impact of CAFOs in Jefferson County:

6. Discussion and staff presentation on Air, Surface Water, Groundwater, and Health concerns Relating to Animal Operations and their Regulation followed by possible action on:

Wehmeier introduced a Presentation on the following topics. Q & A will take place at the end of each section.

- a. <u>Proposed reporting process for manure spills and complaints</u>: A copy of the report was provided for review. Strupp went over the reporting process. Haugom said she receives the manure reports from the DNR and explained Emergency Management's role. Cicero spoke on the coordination between Land and Water Conservation and Emergency Management. No action taken.
- b. Regulation of high-capacity wells: Ward went over the State Statutes and DNR rules. The county does not have any authority over high-capacity wells. Wehmeier said that there is not a policy in place for the county to address concerns related to high-capacity wells. If a policy was put in place, the County would need to set standards. Martin asked about GIS mapping of high-capacity wells.
  - <u>MOTION:</u> Land and Water Conservation Committee Motion by Turville-Heitz/Christensen to explore the use of GIS Mapping to determine the location of high-capacity wells along with other information available. Motion passed by Roll call vote.
- c. <u>Development of composting ordinance for manure and animal mortalities</u>: Ward said that composting manure and animal mortalities are regulated by the DNR. Counties have limited authority to regulate through Shoreland and Floodplain ordinances. Cicero discussed input she received from area farms.
  - <u>MOTION:</u> Solid Waste Committee Motion by Callan/Martin for the Solid Waste Committee to pursue looking into further regulating composting and animal mortalities. Motion passed by roll call vote.
- d. Regulation related to aerial spraying (spray irrigation) of manure and other industrial waste. Cicero talked about her research on spray irrigation, regulations that are in place, and a study conducted by the Wisconsin Manure Irrigation Workgroup. Ward said this is something that the county can regulate. Chilsen talked about microorganisms, pathogens, how exposure can occur, Health Department's role in communicable disease reporting and follow up, and data from a study on irrigation trial in Wisconsin. If it is decided that Jefferson County should regulate spray irrigation, a workgroup could be formed.
  - <u>MOTION:</u> Board of Health Motion by Williams/Turville-Heitz to pursue looking into spray irrigation and the ramifications on public health. Motion passed by roll call vote.
- e. Development of an erosion control and storm water ordinance
  - Zangl discussed data he compiled from surrounding counties, cities, and towns. He also talked about the definitions of erosion control and storm water. Ward discussed the limited authority that counties have to regulate CAFOs. If it is decided that Jefferson County should further regulate erosion control and storm water, a workgroup could be formed.
  - <u>MOTION: Land and Water Conservation Committee</u> Motion by Turville-Heitz/Christensen to have the Land and Water Conservation Committee pursue looking into further regulating erosion control and storm water.
  - Motion amended by Turville-Heitz/Christensen to have three members from the Land and Water Conservation Committee and three members from the Planning and Zoning Committee form a committee to look into further regulating erosion control and storm water. Motion passed by roll call vote. All joint committee members present voted in favor of this motion.
- 7. **Discussion on community outreach and education related to animal operations and their regulation** Chilsen reviewed the education that was provided. No action taken.
- 8. **Discussion and possible action on tentative future meeting schedule and agenda items** No action taken.
- 9. Adjourn

# Conservation Compliance for Farmland Preservation Program Participants



Farmland Preservation Program (FPP) participants are required to implement Wisconsin's Soil and Water Conservation Standards for non-point source pollution control, soil erosion control, nutrient management, and tillage setbacks. A summary of the soil and water conservation standards for FP participants is provided below. To view the complete administrative rules governing farm conservation practices and conservation compliance for Farmland Preservation Program participants, visit <a href="https://example.com/ATCP-50.04">ATCP 50.04</a> and <a href="https://example.com/ATCP-50.16">ATCP 50.16</a>. The soil and water conservation standards listed below may also be regulated by local ordinances. Contact the Land Conservation Department in the county where your farm is located for more information about local regulations.

#### **Cropland and Pasture Standards**

### Develop and implement a nutrient management plan (NMP) annually in accordance with the NRCS 590 standard

- Does not apply to any pasture with one animal unit per acre or less unless nutrients of any kind are mechanically applied to the land.
- Reoccurring gullies are protected with permanent vegetative cover in cropland and pastures.

**Goal**: To use all nutrients, such as manure and other fertilizers, to meet crop needs while reducing potential for runoff into surface water and groundwater.

- Note: A nutrient management plan may be prepared in SnapPlus software by a certified nutrient management planner or a landowner who has attended a DATCP approved training course.
- Cropped fields and pastures meet tolerable soil loss ("T")
  - o "T" represents the maximum average annual rate of soil loss that will permit crop productivity to be sustained economically and indefinitely on a given soil. The average soil loss for a field can be dependent on factors such as soil type, field slope, tillage timing and type, planting equipment, crop rotation, and average rain amounts. Croplands or pastures that are eroding at a rate greater than "T" are not sustainable.
    - Goal: To preserve long-term productivity of soil and preserve economic viability of farming.
  - Note: Field soil loss and "T" values can be found in an NMP completed with SnapPlus or by using USDA-NRCS RUSLE II software.

#### All croplands and pasture meet the Phosphorus Index (PI) standard

- o PI is a model to estimate the risk of phosphorus that may reach surface water bodies.
  - The model considers: location, soil type, soil test P and organic matter, field slope and slope length, tillage, rotation crops and yields, manure and fertilizer applications, downfield slope to surface water, and distance to surface water
- All fields (cropland and pastures) must average a PI of 6 or less over the rotation and do not exceed a PI of 12 in any individual year within the rotation.
  - **Goal:** Reduce the risk of phosphorus delivered to surface water from agricultural fields.
- Note: The PI for a field is calculated in an NMP completed with SnapPlus.

#### • No tillage within a minimum of 5 feet of surface waters

**Goal:** No tillage within [a minimum of] 5 feet of the top of bank of surface waters and vegetation is maintained to ensure bank integrity.

Note: A tillage setback of greater than 5 feet, but no more than 20 feet, may be required depending on site evaluation.



#### Farms with Livestock

 There is self-sustaining sod or vegetative cover adequate to preserve streambank or lakeshore integrity in areas where livestock have access.

Goal: Ensure bank stability to limit erosion and sedimentation to preserve water quality.

• There are no significant discharges of process wastewater to waters of the state from milkhouse waste, feed storage areas or other sources.

**Goal:** Limit nonpoint source water pollution to promote water quality.

- Note: A "significant" discharge is based on factors such as volume, frequency, proximity to receiving waters and slope.
- There are no channels or other visible signs of significant discharge from a feedlot or stored manure into waters of the state.

**Goal:** Limit nonpoint source water pollution to promote water quality.

#### Farms with Manure Storage Facilities

Manure Storage Facilities have no visible signs of leakage or failure.

Goal: Facilities are designed, constructed, and maintained to minimize risk of failure and leakage.

• Manure Storage Facilities are maintained to prevent overflow.

Goal: To store manure, agricultural by-products, wastewater, and contaminated runoff within the maximum operating level of the facility to prevent overtopping.

 Any manure storage facility that has not had manure added or removed from the facility for a period of 24 months has been properly abandoned in accordance with compliance with NRCS standards or has been approved by DNR for continued use.

> Goal: Idle manure facilities be abandoned in compliance with NRCS standards or maintained in an approved manner that will prevent future contamination of groundwater and surface waters.

Manure Storage Facilities constructed or substantially altered after 2002 must meet the NRCS 313 standard.

> Goal: New or substantially altered facilities be designed, constructed, and maintained to minimize risk of failure, leakage and to store manure, agricultural by-products, wastewater, and contaminated runoff to provide the farm operation management flexibility for waste utilization and minimize risk of pollutants reaching ground and surface water.

Farms with land in a Water Quality Management Area (WQMA): I.e. Areas within 1,000 feet from a lake, pond, or flowage or 300 feet from a stream, or in areas susceptible to groundwater contamination.

No unconfined manure piles in a WQMA.

**Goal:** Limit nonpoint source water pollution to promote water quality.

 Clean water, such as rain or snow melt, is diverted away from all feedlots, manure storage areas, and barnyards within WQMAs.

> Goal: Prevent clean water from comingling with pollutants. Limit nonpoint source water pollution to promote water quality.
