Extension Education Committee Minutes

Date of Meeting: June 12, 2023

Call to Order: Chair Kannard called the meeting to order at 8:32 a.m.

Alison Pfau, Jerry Wilcenski, Christine Wen (Area Director) and Kim Buchholz were present in-person.

Steve Chmielewski, Julie Hill and Katelyn Broedlow were present via Zoom.

Certification of Compliance with Open Meetings Law: In compliance.

Public Comment: None

Approval of Agenda: Motion by Herbst, seconded by Foelker to approve the agenda as printed. Motion passed.

Approval of University Extension Education Committee Minutes from May 8, 2023: Motion by Foelker, seconded by Herbst, to approve the minutes as printed. Motion passed.

Communications: Wen shared hard copies of "Extension Strategic Planning Process Report for External Partners" that she shared electronically previously with members. She explained that this is a progress report of what has been identified statewide through the initial stages of the strategic planning process.

Review of 2023 Departmental Budget:

Committee members received a printout of the current budget. No updates to report.

Update on Regional Crops Educator Position:

Wen stated that the Regional Crops Educator position closed last week. Wen explained the interview process and asked if the committee members would like to participate in the process. Kannard stated that he would like to participate. Wen will send him the tentative timeline/dates.

Update on 4-H Summer Assistant

Wilcenski reported that an assistant has been hired with the hope that she will start this week. Her name is Hanna Brattlie. Hanna will attend next month's meeting to meet the committee.

Discussion of Monthly Educator Reports:

Committee members received the Extension May 2023 written report in their agenda packets.

Chrissy Wen, Extension Area Director, gave a brief oral report for FoodWlse in the absence of the Coordinator. A new FoodWlse educator has been hired; she started today. She is bilingual and her home office will be Walworth County but will cover both Jefferson and Walworth Counties.

Steve Chmielewski, Community Development Educator, provided an oral report to the committee.

- Continuing to work with the City of Fort Atkinson with their Local Government Academy to increase civic participation in local government. There are 13 residents enrolled in the five-session series which starts July 25 and runs through September 12.
- The City of Watertown has decided to offer a Local Government Academy. They will kick off theirs in January 2024.
- Work continues with the City of Jefferson Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors on a strategic plan. They are currently in the pre-plan/data gathering phase which will continue through summer. The four-session series with the board will kick off in September.
- The Friends group of the Jefferson County Parks Department has regained momentum. They are looking at to get it up and running by the end of summer.

Alison Pfau, Regional Dairy Educator, provided an oral report for the committee.

- She has been writing dairy articles for publication due to this time of year being very busy for farmers.
- She has had 10 farms agree to participate in her Alternative Forages research project (cover crops) to understand why producers are using them and what is the nutritional value of these crops. She is currently collecting samples from the locations.
- She attended an animal nutrition course in New York for professional development.
- She shared one of her videos on calf-care & comfort to the committee. Very well done and informative. Committee feedback was very positive.

Jerry Wilcenski, 4-H educator, provided an oral report for the committee.

- 14 youth participated in the Livestock Judging contest in Wood County this past week. All our teams
 qualified for the State Competition which will take place on July 24.
- The Jefferson County Meats Judging Team has qualified for nationals in Kansas in October.
- The Dairy Project hosted their Dairy Project Learning Days on June 10 and 11. It was a successful 2day event that offered great educational opportunities for youth.
- The Dairy Committee also hosted a Dairy Tour where youth and parents were able to visit four dairy locations within the County and see various aspects of modern dairy operations. Many of the participants were new to dairy. Was a good experience for all who attended.
- This Friday is Cloverbud Day Camp that will be held at our office. An additional Cloverbud Day Camp will be held in August.
- There will be one 4-H Club turning into a SPIN Club which will focus on Career Readiness.
- Wilcenski is working on developing his plan of work.

Julie Hill, Horticulture Educator, provided an oral report for the committee.

- Julie is answering many horticulture questions on random topics for Rock, Walworth and Jefferson Counties.
- She provided a Garden Talk this past Friday.
- Next week is Pollinator Week. There are many educational opportunities being offered. All educational
 opportunities are free but must pre-register. On Wednesday, Julie will be presenting at the Jefferson
 Library.

AGRICULTURE



If it happens on a farm or in a field, the Extension Institute of Agriculture works with you to achieve better results. Our innovative dairy management programs range from genetics to farm and business management. Extension researchers work hand-in-hand with row crop, forage and fresh produce growers to provide best practices for every aspect of the growing phase. We also advise communities on using sustainable practices to create inviting spaces free from invasive species. Our work supports people, communities and businesses.

- Planning and development of a carbon conference for dairy owners and managers, consultants, engineers, and
 agribusiness professionals in collaboration with Iowa State University Extension, University of Minnesota
 Extension, and University of Illinois Extension. The goal of this effort is to teach individuals best management
 practices to reduce or mitigate greenhouse gas emissions and how to enter, navigate, and discuss carbon
 markets to address dairy production management, thus improving farm business management viability and
 environmental sustainability. (Alison Pfau)
- The University of Wisconsin Madison Division of Extension is developing a research project involving alternative forages. The goal of this research is to answer the farmer questions about the use and feeding guidelines, and also get a better understand the economic implications of planting and harvesting these alternatives forages (Alison Pfau)
- An article written for the Dairy Topic Hub for dairy farmers and consultants explaining the importance of the
 colostrum after calving. The goal of this effort is to provide readers with a base level understanding of the
 importance of feeding colostrum to newborn calves in the first hours of birth and the positive effects of the
 colostrum over the calf health. (Alison Pfau)
- Planning and developing short educational videos in Spanish and English, emphasizing different dairy farming
 practices and topics such as calf care, nutrition, dairy production, reproduction, health, farm worker/farm
 manager relationship and animal welfare. Also, in partnership with the regional crops educator, will planning
 videos about soil health, weed and pest management and diversified cropping systems. (Alison Pfau)

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



The Community Economic Development program promotes local economic well-being and quality of life in Wisconsin communities. We work with and support community economic development practitioners and organizations, tribal and governmental entities, and business and nonprofit organizations and help gain access to the information, research, education, and technical assistance necessary to make informed decisions.

- Pre-planning and needs assessment conducted for the Jefferson Chamber of Commerce with Executive director to determine need and readiness/commitment level of stakeholders to initiate a strategic planning process. (Steve Chmielewski)
- Planning with Fort Atkinson to assess resident learning needs, develop program goals and customize content for development and promotion of their first Local Government Academy which included the successful development of a grant proposal to sponsor program material expenses. (Steve Chmielewski)



HEALTH & WELL-BEING

HORTICULTURE



The UW-Madison's Extension Horticulture Program provide research-based horticulture information to Wisconsinites so they can make gardening decisions that keep their plants healthy while protecting the environment. We provide research-and evidence-based horticulture management education, resources and decision-making tools to home gardeners and commercial horticulture practitioners.

- Planning and development of the optional Lab component of the fall 2023 Foundations in Gardening online course that will provide an opportunity for course participants to dig deeper into important horticulture concepts and apply what they learn through interactive activities. (Julie Hill)
- A yearlong activity/service for residents of Jefferson County to provide research based reliable information to their horticulture questions. The goal of this effort is to educate individuals of Jefferson County so they can implement best practices in their landscapes that will positively affect the environment and their communities. (Julie Hill)
- A community of practice for horticulture educators where we explore strategies and resources to expand
 horticulture education and outreach to underrepresented audiences. The goal of participating in this group is to
 dig into ways we can locally continue to grow and enhance our horticulture programs to reach more diverse
 audiences. (Julie Hill)
- Planning for the creation of a repository of existing horticultural resources in multiple languages for home/community gardeners of all abilities. The goal of this effort is to make this repository accessible on the Horticulture Topic Hub. (Julie Hill)
- Planning statewide and local activities for consumer audiences (home gardeners) for National Pollinator Week in collaboration with local, regional and state partners. This effort is designed to increase knowledge and awareness of pollinators, pollinator habitat, and adopt practices that increase habitat and mitigate pollinator decline. (Julie Hill)
- informal learning communities utilizing the Horticulture Program's social media for all Wisconsin gardeners, including underserved populations. The goal of this effort is to provide accurate, practical and up-to-date information to the public primarily through the topic hub in order to bolster educational outreach efforts in support of addressing the Horticulture Program objectives. (Julie Hill)
- Planning for a statewide webinar series for consumer horticulture audiences where participants learn best horticultural practices to mitigate pollinator decline and climate change, decrease environmental contamination



and pollution, and grow healthy plants for sustainable gardens and communities. The goal of this effort is to increase adoption of best horticultural practices addressing environmental issues in Wisconsin. (Julie Hill)

Positive Youth Development



The UW-Madison's Extension Horticulture Program provide research-based horticulture information to Wisconsinites so they can make gardening decisions that keep their plants healthy while protecting the environment. We provide research- and evidence-based horticulture management education, resources and decision-making tools to home gardeners and commercial horticulture practitioners.

- A county wide project learning course for 4-H horse and pony project members, where youth can build on horse knowledge and care skills. This effort is designed to create a greater knowledge base in equine vet sciences, color genetics, breed standards, equine nutrition and care. (Jerry Wilcenski)
- Dairy science educational county wide programming focused on youth Spark and expanding understanding of the whole dairy industry in Jefferson County. The goal of this effort is to provide opportunities for youth who do not live on farms to learn about and work hands-on at dairy farms as well as learn about industry career paths. (Jerry Wilcenski)
- A county wide project learning course for 4-H livestock project members, where youth can build on livestock feeding and care skills. This effort is designed to assist all youth trouble shoot livestock care problems, develop a plan of work for their projects, and learn about food safety and quality. (Jerry Wilcenski)
