- Developing teaching and marketing materials for the UW-Madison Division of Extension Wisconsin Dairy
  Reproduction Roadshow, a multi-location in-person series for dairy producers and industry professionals to
  improve their herd's reproductive performance and increase their economic sustainability. (Alison Pfau)
- Planning and developing short educational videos in Spanish and English, emphasizing different dairy farming
  practices and topics such as calf care, nutrition, dairy production, reproduction, health, farm worker/farm
  manager relationship and animal welfare. Also, in partnership with the regional crops educator, will planning
  videos about soil health, weed and pest management and diversified cropping systems. (Alison Pfau)
- Development of partnership and trust-base relationship with dairy farmers, dairy workers and field plant reps, providing them with available dairy resources and programs to support improving dairy production. (Alison Pfau)
- Planning for education outreach for dairy producers and allied industry professionals in collaboration with Dairy Program Colleagues and UW-Madison Department of Animal and Dairy Sciences Colleagues. The goal of this



effort is to increase knowledge of enteric methane emissions within dairy farms so that production practices can be adapted with sustainability in mind. (Alison Pfau)

#### **HEALTH & WELL-BEING**



The Extension Institute of Health & Well-Being works to catalyze positive change in Wisconsin families through evidence-based programs focused on nutrition, food security and safety, chronic disease prevention, mental health promotion, and prevention of substance abuse. Rooted in both urban and rural communities, we're working together to help solve the state's most pressing well-being needs and to ensure that all Wisconsinites live stronger, healthier lives.

- FoodWlse will complete a five-week nutrition lesson series at the Fort Atkinson Senior Center on Tuesday,
  February 6th. We have had 8 unique participants. We discussed the importance of eating fruits and vegetables,
  how much adults need to consume daily, how much exercise adults need, challenges of getting enough fruits
  and vegetables into our diets and being active. We made smoothies with participants and provided healthy
  recipes. We taught participants to read food labels, convert sugar from grams to teaspoons, and measured sugar
  from common grocery items. (Lisa Krolow)
- We will repeat this series at the Senior Centers in Watertown and Jefferson this Spring. The ADRC of Jefferson
  County is currently working on opening additional meal sites in Jefferson County and we will look forward to
  scheduling lessons at these new sites. (Lisa Krolow)
- FoodWise has completed one series in a Jefferson County Head Start classroom in Fort Atkinson and started 2
  more in Jefferson. We have an additional 7 classrooms scheduled for series in February and March. In addition,
  we have dates for 2 Head Start Parent events in March and April. We will address budgeting for healthy food
  and food safety. The parent lessons will be presented in both English and Spanish. (Lisa Krolow)
- The Jefferson County FoodWise team has been chosen to participate in a Tai Chi pilot program. We will attend
  training in June. The target population for this program is older adults. We are very excited to introduce this new
  opportunity at the Senior Centers and Senior Subsidized Housing Sites that we are currently visiting. (Lisa
  Krolow)

#### HORTICULTURE



The UW-Madison's Extension Horticulture Program provide research-based horticulture information to Wisconsinites so they can make gardening decisions that keep their plants healthy while protecting the environment. We provide researchand evidence-based horticulture management education, resources and decision-making tools to home gardeners and commercial horticulture practitioners.

- A yearlong activity/service for residents of Jefferson County to provide research-based answers to their horticulture questions. The goal of this effort is to educate individuals of Jefferson County so they can implement best practices in their landscapes that will positively affect the environment and their communities.   - o 2023 summary:



- 64 inquiries answered this year that were identified from Jefferson County (roughly the same as last year).
- Many different topics covered including tree health, plant and weed identification, soil health, insects, lawn and more.
- Continued efforts will be made to promote the availability of this service to Jefferson County residents.
- Planning and development of an educational program about the practice of "No Mow May" on pollinator health for consumer horticulture audiences. The goal of this effort is to increase knowledge and awareness of pollinators, pollinator habitat, and adopt practices that increase habitat and mitigate pollinator decline.
