Review of 2024 Departmental Budget: Wen stated that there is no printout but the budget is on target.

**Introduction of Janel Heidelmeier, Associate Area Extension Director:** Wen introduced Heidelmeier to the committee. Wen stated Heidelmeier will be shadowing her for the year. Heidelmeier stated this is a great professional development opportunity for her and will be serving Area 19 along with Chrissy months to learn more about the AED role. Heidelmeier also serves as the 4-h Program Educator in Walworth County.

**Extension Office Marketing Plan:** Wen stated Steve Chmielewski was unable to attend today due to sickness. Wen noted the office team has met twice to determine the marketing needs in the county. The marketing plan is currently in the exploratory phase.

#### **Discussion of Monthly Educator Reports:**

Committee members received the Extension January 2024 written report in their agenda packets.

Steve Chmielewski, Community Development Educator, was unable to attend the meeting.

 Wen reminded the committee that Chmielewski is planning a Regional Broadband workshop in Waterloo and asked them to attend if able. The target audience is community leaders and internet providers. The overarching goal is to maximize the impact of BEAD funding by planning and partnering toward internet for all.

Alison Pfau, Regional Dairy Educator, provided an oral report for the committee.

- She is hosting the REPRO Road Show next week in Dane County. This workshop is to update Dairy farmers on reproduction.
- She continues to collaborate on methane mitigation. She will use this study to create educational articles, videos, podcasts, etc. She will also generate info in Spanish.

• In April, she will be administering a training on proper vaccination of animals. The training will be provided in both Spanish and English.

Jerry Wilcenski, 4-H educator, provided an oral report for the committee.

- The Wisconsin 4-H Impact Report was handed out for the committee to review.
- He had a Bake-Off competition and Food 4Ward program yesterday. In the Food 4Ward program youth learned out cheesemaking. The next Food 4Ward program will be about small grains and the Bake-Off competition will be making sourdough bread.
- Project learning day is being held next weekend for youth to learn about all different projects 4-H
  offers
- He noted many project meetings are starting to kick off.
- He stated that the Jefferson County Meats Judging Team participated in the State Meats Judging Contest that was held last weekend and did well.
- Kannard encouraged Jerry to connect with the Fair Park during the transition of the fair.
- Discussion on participation with 4-H at the fair was had.

Julie Hill, Horticulture Educator, provided an oral report for the committee.

- She gave a summary of questions from last year. 64 questions were recorded from Jefferson County. She answered a variety of questions: soil testing, insect id, tree health, etc. She plans to continue to promote this service in Jefferson County.
- She noted that data will be available for Master Gardener Volunteer hours at the next meeting.
- She continues to develop many presentations for the year and schedule presentations.
- She has been working on many online horticulture programs. These types allow people to watch them on their own time.

Lisa Krolow, FoodWise Coordinator, was unable to attend the meeting. Her written report was provided.

- The Jefferson County FoodWise Annual Report was handed out.
- Wen stated FoodWlse is still new in the county and they are networking and expanding their partner list.

Josh Kamps, Regional Crops Educator, was unable to attend the meeting. His written report was provided.

Bilingual Regional Dairy Educator Potential Change in Counties Served

An opportunity has come up to rearrange the geography served by Alison Pfau, Bilingual Regional Diary Educator, from five counties to four counties. In this proposal, Dodge County would shift away from being part of Alison's region and she would serve Jefferson, Dane, Rock, and Walworth Counties. One benefit of this would be the increased education and attention to dairy producers in these four counties.

This change would have minor financial impacts on the counties investing in this position, increasing the annual cost per county by about \$2400. For Jefferson County, this increase would fit into our approved budget due to the savings with the Community Educator position shifting to the co-funded model. Here is a breakdown of the proposed and current costs associated with this position:

If all the counties involved agree to this, Alison's shift to a four-county geography wouldn't take effect until the educator serving Dodge, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, and Fond du Lac counties is hired. At that time, we may need to amend the 2024 contract.

I look forward to discussing this more with you at the March committee meeting.

  practices and topics such as calf care, nutrition, dairy production, reproduction, health, farm worker/farm
  manager relationship and animal welfare. Also, in partnership with the regional crops educator, will planning






# Wisconsin 4-H Youth Survey (Thriving) 2023 Results


