8. Discussion and Possible Action on encouraging the state to fund the Wisconsin Purchase of Agricultural Easement (PACE) Program

A copy of the Resolution - Encouraging Governor Evers and the Wisconsin Legislature to Support Funding the Wisconsin Purchase of Agricultural Conservation Easement Program was provided for review. Wehmeier and Cicero discussed the program and gave an update on where the money will come.

Jones, Finance Committee Chair, introduced Ordinance No. 2024-08. Amendment to Rules for Reimbursement of Expenses Section 1:

RULES FOR REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES 64.06 MEALS.

Eligible persons shall be reimbursed for meals purchased while on county business. Reimbursement shall:

- (a) not exceed the actual amount spent (including sales tax), as per IRS Regulations (Publication 15);
- (b) not exceed the applicable per diem rates as per IRS Publication 1542;
- (c) require itemized receipts for reimbursement, in order to comply with IRS regulations for Accountable Plans (Publication 15);
- (d) be for the actual amount spent, including gratuities, not to exceed \$10.00 for breakfast, \$15.00 for noon meals and \$25.00 for evening meals (See exception for convention or conference banquet tickets.);
- (e) In addition, County Board members shall be reimbursed for meals purchased while on county business within Jefferson County;
- (f) Sheriff's Department employees, when executing a Governor's Warrant for extradition, shall be reimbursed at actual costs for meal expense, not to exceed applicable per diem rates as per IRS Publication 1542. The Sheriff's Department may advance such funds; and (Res. No. 2000-77, 01-09-2001)
- (g) County employees shall not be reimbursed for meals purchased while on county business within Jefferson County unless authorized by the employee's department head. [Amended 12/13/05, Ord. No. 2005-36; am. 07/10/07, Ord. No. 2007-17]
- (h) Eligible persons shall not be reimbursed for expenditures for alcohol beverages. [Amended 01/08/08, Ord. No. 2007-30]

Section 2: This ordinance amendment shall be effective upon passage and publication as provided by law. Fiscal Note: In 2023 the total County budget for meals

was \$20,140 and actual expenses were \$12,843. In 2022 the total County budget for meals was \$20,466 and actual expenses were \$8,046. Increasing the meal allowance is not expected to have a significant impact on the County budget.

Jones, Finance Committee Chair, introduced Resolution No. 2024-29. Final Resolution regarding Unconditional County Guaranty of its Pro Rata Share, Intergovernmental Agreement and Taxable Revenue Bond Financing for Bug Tussel 2, LLC Project

Fiscal Note: In the event of a default by Bug Tussel 2, the Debt Service Reserve Fund will pay any interest and principal immediately due to bondholders. At that time, Jefferson County would be responsible for replenishing the Debt Service Reserve Fund. Hilbert Communications would be responsible for reimbursing Jefferson County for any amounts drawn from the Debt Service Reserve Fund. Should Hilbert Communications default on its obligation to Jefferson County. Jefferson County will assume ownership of the assets financed with the bond proceeds. In exchange for the risk assumed by Jefferson County, Bug Tussel 2 will pay to Jefferson County a fee for its guaranty of the bond payments of 40 basis points (0.40%) times Jefferson County's pro rata share of the outstanding bond obligation. At the time of issuance, this fee equates to \$20,000 per year and will decline over the term of the bond in proportion to the outstanding debt balance. Because this fee has a limited term and declining balance over time, it is recommended that the fee be treated as one-time revenue and deposited into the Capital Projects Fund for the purpose of funding future one-time capital purchases.

Jefferson County Ordinance No. 2021-01 outlines the approved routes for ATV/UTV usage in Jefferson County and sets forth the rules of operation on County ATV/UTV routes. Jefferson County requested approval from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to add segments of State Highway to ATV/UTV routes. This ordinance amendment adds segments of State Highway to the approved routes to allow for bridge crossings. It also makes minor updates and revisions to the existing language for clarity.

Jaeckel, Planning and Zoning Committee Chair, introduced Ordinance No. 2024-10. Amending Official Zoning Map

WHEREAS, the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors has heretofore been petitioned to amend the official zoning map of Jefferson County, and

Stat. 92.09 empowers Land and Water Conservation Departments (LWCDs) to administer county soil and water conservation programs and may exercise the powers granted to the land conservation committee; and

WHEREAS, county LWCDs are the local delivery mechanism for a wide range of Wisconsin's natural soil and water and other resource management programs including non-point pollution control, farmland preservation, reclamation of non-metallic mines, invasive species control, woodland management, lakes protection, and more; and

WHEREAS, LWCD professionals work as trusted, technical advisors to support producerled watershed groups, assist waterfront property owners, help farmers develop and implement nutrient management plans, respond to natural disasters like floods, and spend years building the trust to be able to successfully do so; and

Supporting Local Control Over Concentrated Animal Feeding Facilities' Operations

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin adopted ATCP 51, Livestock Facility Siting, in 2006; and

WHEREAS, every four years, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is required to appoint a technical expert committee to review ATCP 51. Despite the committee meeting in 2010, 2014, and 2018, and suggesting multiple revisions to ATCP 51, the rule has remained unchanged since its adoption in 2006; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, DATCP proposed several rule revisions to ATCP 51, based on recommendations by the technical expert committee and public comments made by organizations and citizen stakeholders. These rule revisions were never adopted, and ATCP 51 remained unchanged since its adoption in 2006; and

WHEREAS, the only required permit for CAFOs in Wisconsin is issued and enforced by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). Funding shortfalls impacting the DNR has limited the agency's ability to regulate CAFO's wastewater discharges; and

WHEREAS, the nonpartisan State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau reviewed the DNR's performance implementing the Wisconsin Pollution Discharge Elimination Systems (WPDES) Program and found in Report 16-6, dated June 2016, that the DNR was unable to administer and maintain a WPDES permit program consistent with the requirements established under the Clean Water Act and Chapter 283, Wis. Stats.; and

WHEREAS, permitted CAFOs in Wisconsin have greatly expanded since the adoption of ATCP 51 in 2006. There were 135 permitted CAFOs in 2006 and there are 336 permitted CAFOs in 2023, a 250% increase over 17 years. According to the Department of Natural Resources an average of 15 new CAFO permits are issued each year; and

WHEREAS, human health and welfare may be impacted by the construction, operation, and expansion of CAFOs in the State of Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, despite the multiple impacts CAFOs may cause in a community i.e., road damage, biosecurity, air pollution, property values, and emergency services, the DNR WPDES permit only addresses wastewater discharges; and

WHEREAS, local units of government have the authority to draft and pass ordinances that protect the public health and safety of residents, as well as protect the financial well-being of the County; and

WHEREAS, Bayfield County drafted and passed a CAFO Operations Ordinance to address the impacts associated with CAFOs in 2016. This Operations Ordinance has since been adopted by two counties and six towns in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, local control is a foundational governing concept in Wisconsin. It is designed to place decision-making authority at the level of government closest to the people impacted; and

WHEREAS, County Board Supervisors are elected by the residents of the County and as such, are best equipped to draft and pass ordinances that reflect their constituents' values than their counterparts in Madison.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support efforts to protect Wisconsin Counties' local control over the operations of CAFOs.

Enacting Stronger Regulations to Limit the Spread of Chronic Wasting Disease

WHEREAS, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is a fatal neurological disease of cervids which threatens to cause significant economic, cultural and ecological damage to Wisconsin's deer and elk populations; and

WHEREAS, since its discovery in Wisconsin in a deer harvested in 2001 it has now spread to wild deer in 41 counties and has been found in over 25 captive cervid farms; and

WHEREAS, there are 60 counties that are CWD affected, either having CWD detected in the county or are within 10 miles of CWD detection; and

WHEREAS, in the most highly infected areas of Dane and Iowa counties the prevalence rate in adult males is about 50 percent and in adult females about 35 percent; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Health, the Centers for Disease Control, and the World Health Organization all recommend that cervid meat only be eaten after the animal harvested has tested negative for CWD; and

WHEREAS, in 2023 nearly 800,000 gun and archery deer hunting licenses were sold in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, according to a recent study, hunters in Wisconsin spent about \$2.5 billion annually. Eighty-eight percent of the hunters in Wisconsin participated in deer hunting, making it the most popular form of hunting in the state; and

WHEREAS, with no known cure or preventative vaccine, the only option currently available to manage CWD is to aggressively limit the transmission and spread of CWD; and

WHEREAS, current regulations do not adequately limit the human-assisted transmission of CWD.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby urge the State Legislature to make the following changes to State Statutes and supporting Administrative Rules:

- Change ATCP 10.56(1) to eliminate the exceptions that allow the transport of live cervids without a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- Change NR 10.105(7) to prohibit the export of cervid carcasses which have any
 part of the spinal column or head attached from CWD affected areas in which
 wild or captive cervids have tested positive for CWD within the last 10 years.
- Enact new rules to require the disposal of harvested cervid carcasses in landfills, rendering, or composting facilities capable of managing carcasses safely.
- Enact new rules to prohibit the export of live cervids from areas within 10 miles of a known positive CWD detection within the last 5 years.
- Enact new rules to require all captive cervid operations to install either solid perimeter or double fencing.
- Once a reliable live animal CWD test has been developed, enact rules to prohibit the transport of live cervids unless the animal tests negative of CWD.

Per- and Poly- Fluoroalkyl Testing for Biosolids

WHEREAS, according to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) PFAS Action Plan 2020, per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a group of over 5,000 human made chemicals that were invented in the 1930s; and

WHEREAS, these chemicals have been used in products ranging anywhere from nonstick cookware, waterproof clothing, and stain-resistant textiles to Aqueous Film Forming Foam (AFFF) firefighting foam and food packaging; and

WHEREAS, these chemicals are exceptionally resistant to degradation and, when discharged into the environment, linger for prolonged periods of time and may bioaccumulate in humans, fish and wildlife; and

WHEREAS, in recent years, it has been discovered that PFAS substances bioaccumulate in the human body and studies have found that 98% of Americans have measurable levels of PFAS in their blood; and

WHEREAS, according to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), certain PFAS substances pose a number of risks to human health, including developmental problems in fetuses and infants, certain types of cancer, reduced antibody response, decreased immune response to vaccinations, and kidney disease; and

WHEREAS, the WDNR and Department of Health Services updated the recommended rainbow smelt consumption advisory from an unrestricted amount to one meal per month for Lake Superior due to the high levels of PFAS found in the samples; and

WHEREAS, according to the WDNR "Annual Municipal Sludge Land Applied Report," Sanitary Districts, both located in and outside of Wisconsin routinely and regularly spread biosolids on land in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, the biosolids spread on land in Wisconsin are not regularly tested for PFAS.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support legislative, policy and regulatory action requiring:

- That all biosolids applied to land <u>or processed for retail sale</u> in Wisconsin be tested prior to application and meet all standards for safe land application according to the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy "Biosolids and Sludge PFAS Sampling Guidance" published April 2022.
- That test results <u>above acceptable PFAS</u> limits must be submitted to the County's Land Conservation Department, and the property owner where the biosolids will be applied, at least three <u>five</u> days prior to the biosolids application.

WHEREAS, the Refugee Act of 1980 states in 8 U.S.C. 1522(a)(1)(A)(iii) "local voluntary agency activities should be conducted in close cooperation and advance consultation with State and local governments (emphasis added); and

WHEREAS, the Refugee Act of 1980 states in 8 U.S.C. 1522(a)(2)(A): "The Director and the Federal agency administering subsection (b)(1), shall consult regularly (not less often than quarterly) with State and local governments and private nonprofit voluntary agencies concerning the sponsorship process and the intended distribution of refugees among the States and localities before their placement in those States and localities" (emphasis added); and

WHEREAS, the Refugee Act of 1980 states in 8 U.S.C. 1522(a)(2)(B): "The Director shall develop and implement, in consultation with representatives of voluntary agencies and State and local governments, policies and strategies for the placement and resettlement of refugees within the United States" (emphasis added); and

WHEREAS, the Refugee Act of 1980 states in 8 U.S.C. 1522(a)(2)(C)(ii) that the Director of the Office of Refugee Resettlement will "provide for a mechanism whereby representatives of local affiliates of voluntary agencies regularly (not less often than quarterly) meet with representatives of State and local governments to plan and coordinate in advance of their arrival the appropriate placement of refugees among the various States and localities, (emphasis added); and

WHEREAS, the Refugee Act of 1980 states in 8 U.S.C. 1522(a)(2)(C)(iii)(ll), "the availability of employment opportunities, affordable housing, and public and private resources (including educational, health care, and mental health services) for refugees in the area" be taken into account before the placement and resettlement of refugees; and

WHEREAS, the residents of Washburn County currently face shortages of affordable housing, health care services, mental health services, and public transportation in Washburn County; and

WHEREAS, World Relief, a Christian Humanitarian organization, provides intense services for a period of ninety (90) days, and for up to five (5) years to refugees placed and resettled into an area; and

WHEREAS, after the aforementioned period of ninety (90) days that World Relief provides intense services, local government and community partners will be responsible for providing ongoing services to refugees placed and resettled into an area, thus impacting the local government and community partners budgets; and

WHEREAS, Washburn County residents would be impaired by demands on local resources by the primary resettlement of refugees in Washburn County without proper planning.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby recommend a moratorium on the placement of refugees through primary resettlement until World Relief demonstrates the following: (1) they are in full compliance with the aforementioned federal statutes; (2) an objective independent economic impact study detailing all costs to taxpayers for refugees has been completed and reviewed by the County Board; and (3) counties are informed how the capacity of primary resettlement of refugees is determined and what matrix is being used to determine resettlement allocations. This moratorium allows time for the budget considerations necessary for any primary resettlement of refugees.

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Statute Section 252.041 permits individuals, for reasons of religion or conscience, to refuse vaccination during a public health emergency; and

WHEREAS, the Langlade County Board of Supervisors finds that forced masking, vaccine, and isolation mandates may have caused harm to adults and children by contributing to isolation and increasing mental health crises and social anxieties. These mandates may also have affected verbal, motor, and overall development of children born during the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, as of August 2023, masking mandates have been renewed in areas of the country where COVID-19 transmission increases have been identified; and

WHEREAS, the Langlade County Board of Supervisors finds it is essential that the Board express its position that, unless required by law, Langlade County residents should not have their civil liberties jeopardized by mandates pertaining to face coverings or masking, vaccine requirements, or forced isolation, and should be free to make their own choices regarding whether to, and where to, utilize face coverings, vaccinate, or isolate.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby express its position that, unless required by law, county residents should not have their civil liberties jeopardized by mandates pertaining to face coverings or masking, vaccine requirements, or forced isolation, and should be free to make their own choices regarding whether to, and where to, utilize face coverings, vaccinate, or isolate.

WHEREAS, the Committee supports 2023 Senate Bill 87 to amend Section 973.20 (8), Wis. Stats., and to create Section 973.20 (4c), Wis. Stats., relating to restitution upon conviction of vehicular homicide: and

WHEREAS, under the proposed Senate Bill, if a person is convicted of the crime of homicide by intoxicated use of a vehicle, and the victim of the homicide is a parent of a minor child, the restitution order may include the reasonable and necessary costs of maintenance for each child of the victim until the child turns 18 or until the child turns 19 if the child is still enrolled in high school; and

WHEREAS, under the proposed bill, when setting restitution paid to a parent or guardian of a victim's child, the court may also consider the financial needs and resources of the child and the surviving parent or guardian, the standard of living that the child is accustomed to, the child's emotional needs and physical and legal custody arrangements, and the reasonable work-related child care expenses of the surviving parent or guardian; and

WHEREAS, the proposed bill specifies that a parent or guardian of a victim's children also retains the right to file a civil suit against the defendant, and that restitution ordered to a parent or guardian of the victim's children will offset any damages awarded in the civil suit. Additionally, if the parent or guardian is awarded civil damages before restitution is ordered, the restitution order will be reduced by the amount of civil damages awarded to the parent or guardian.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support 2023 Senate Bill 87 relating to restitution upon conviction of vehicular homicide including the reasonable and necessary costs of maintenance for each child of the victim until the child turns 18 or until the child turns 19 if the child is still enrolled in high school.

Relating to

Requesting that the Wisconsin Legislature Provide Additional Judges, Assistant District Attorneys and Public Defenders to Address the Current Historical Backlog of Court Cases in Counties Across Wisconsin

WHEREAS, the courts in Brown County, like the courts in many other counties in the State of Wisconsin, are currently underfunded and understaffed, resulting in a historic backlog of cases; and

WHEREAS, from 2013 through 2023, the number of pending felony criminal cases in Brown County grew by 250%, from 823 cases to 2,886 cases, and the number of pending misdemeanor cases in Brown County grew by 152%, from 450 cases to 1,137 cases, for a total of 4,023 pending cases; and

WHEREAS, in 2022, the median age of a pending felony criminal case in Brown County was 264 days, higher than Counties in our region of similar size to, or larger than, Brown County; and from 2013 through 2022, the number of pending felony criminal cases in Brown County that are more than 2 years old grew by 4,450%, from 8 cases in 2013 to 364 cases in 2022, trailing only Milwaukee and Dane counties; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the State to fund Judges, District Attorneys and Public Defenders, but: 1) Brown County only has one Judge per 34,154 residents (Outagamie County has one Judge per 27,446 residents; Milwaukee County has one judge per 19,545 residents); 2) Brown County only has one Assistant District Attorney per 21,017 residents (Outagamie County has one Assistant District Attorney per 12,808 residents; Milwaukee County has one Assistant District Attorney per 7,177 residents); and 3) the lack of state-funded Public Defenders that serve Brown County has forced Brown County Judges to appoint attorneys for defendants at County expense, which effectively shifts the cost of providing Public Defenders from the State to the County; and

WHEREAS, Brown County has spent \$42 million in capital expenditures to build three jail pods to house inmates, many of whom are awaiting their day in court and would have otherwise already been sentenced to a term in a State prison at State expense, demonstrating that the State is engaging in cost-shifting the housing of inmates from the State to Counties; and

WHEREAS, Brown County also spends \$6.9 million annually in tax levy to supplement this underfunded and understaffed State Court System, placing an unnecessary burden on the taxpayers and residents of Brown County; and

WHEREAS, delays in cases due to the State not providing Counties with enough Judges, Assistant District Attorneys and Public Defenders can cause witnesses and evidence to become unavailable or unreliable, putting prosecution of the cases at risk, and can violate a Defendant's right to a speedy trial; and

WHEREAS, according to Wisconsin Public Radio, while wages were increased for Public Defenders and Prosecutors, the number of active attorneys in Wisconsin has decreased by 4% over the last four years, enrollment at the two Wisconsin law schools has decreased over the last five years, and nearly half of Wisconsin attorneys live in seven of Wisconsin's 72 Counties, making finding or appointing an attorney (often at County expense) when no Public Defender is available extremely difficult in rural Counties, and very difficult in populous Counties, adding to the case backlogs across the State.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby request that the State of Wisconsin: 1) conduct a thorough review of the Statewide Court System, and adequately fund additional Judges, Assistant District Attorneys and Public Defenders in Counties where per capita data clearly shows such additional positions are needed; and 2) provide Brown County with an additional two Judges and with an additional nine Assistant District Attorneys, in order to make the per capita rate of Judges and Assistant District Attorneys in Brown County more equitable and in-line with the per capita rates of other similar counties in Wisconsin.

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Administrative Code DOC 350.04 requires the construction and remodeling of county jails to be approved by the state Department of Corrections to ensure all state statutory requirements are met; and

WHEREAS, after the construction of county jails, the state Department of Corrections has used annual jail inspections to impose facility changes that are not supported by state statute and funded by state appropriations; and

WHEREAS, state jail inspections have required the expansion of jail medical treatment and examination rooms beyond their originally state-approved designs without the statutory support or funding to do so; and

WHEREAS, state jail inspections have required the addition of jail programming staff and the expansion of programming rooms beyond the original jail designs without the statutory support or funding to do so; and

WHEREAS, state jail inspections have added quarantine requirements to jail cells that are not specified in state statute, which necessitate expensive facility redesign and expansion to accomplish; and

WHEREAS, state jail inspections have invoked a 30-year replacement criteria for county jails that significantly reduces the life expectancy of facilities designed to last over 50 years; and

WHEREAS, state jail inspections have imposed requirements to increase the number of jail receiving cells beyond the facility's state-approved design that are not supported by statute or the funding to do so; and

WHEREAS, state jail inspections have imposed the inmate classification requirements of the federal Prison Rape Elimination Act before this Act has been incorporated into state code, thereby forcing counties to make costly process changes without the state funding to do so; and

WHEREAS, the actions of state jail inspectors to mandate unfunded facility changes that are not supported by state statutory code places many millions of dollars of financial burden on

the county tax levy and could cause the early retirement of facilities that are in compliance with state statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby consider it inappropriate for the state Department of Corrections' jail inspectors to impose unfunded mandates not supported by state code to facilities previously approved by the State Department of Corrections to meet code; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that counties call on the state legislative oversight committee of the Department of Corrections to investigate the unfunded mandates being imposed by the Department of Corrections inspections division in order to adopt the mandates into state statute and fund their implementation, and/or to restrain the department's mandates, as appropriate.

WHEREAS, the existence of puppy mills, that is breeding environments in which puppies are bred primarily in pursuit of profit and are cared for only minimally, is unconscionable for reasons including, but not limited to, the way animals are treated and the significant consumer risks related to unhealthy animals; and

WHEREAS, the federal Animal Welfare Act, which governs the humane treatment of animals bred for purposes of sale, is administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service and has been highly ineffective in stopping puppy mills due to limited authority and lax enforcement; and

WHEREAS, 2009 Wisconsin Act 90, which took effect on June 1, 2011, and is administered by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP) and which was intended to protect dogs and the people who buy or adopt them, also suffers from limited scope and insufficient enforcement; and

WHEREAS, consistent, uniform, statewide application of enhanced animal welfare statutes and significantly increased enforcement of such statutes is essential to effectively address the multitude of negative impacts from puppy mills, the multiple sources of breeders who mistreat animals, and the multiple ways in which bad breeders mistreat animals, which includes, but is not limited to, overbreeding; inbreeding; minimal veterinary care; lack of socialization, exercise, and enrichment; lack of adequate food, water, and shelter; and lack of sanitation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby encourage the State of Wisconsin to enhance its animal welfare laws related to the regulation of dog breeders, sellers, and facility operators; to significantly increase its enforcement efforts and resources to stop puppy mills in the State of Wisconsin and to stop the inflow of puppies into Wisconsin from puppy mills outside of Wisconsin; and to create a consistent, uniform, statewide approach for curtailing puppy mills, protecting consumers, and preventing animal abuse and mistreatment related to puppy mills.

WHEREAS, the Barron County Board of Supervisors is desirous to have these state statutes changed to reflect the oversight necessary to assess and monitor the tax levy applicable to the Act 150 and Act 420 expenditures remitted from the counties to the municipal libraries.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby request that the above state statutes be changed as follows:

- 43.54 (1)(d): To allow per diem payments from county appropriations as deemed allowable and necessary by the County Board of Supervisors absent any permission(s) from the municipal library board or municipal governing body.
- 43.60 (3)(c)(a): To allow County Board Supervisor appointments to the municipal library board in proportion to the amount of Act 150 and Act 420 payments remitted to the total expenditures of that specific municipal library. For example:
 - o Total Yearly Library Expenditure: \$300,000 (100%)
 - o Act 150 and Act 420 County Appropriation: \$100,000 (33%)

County board representation then would be 33% of the total makeup of the municipal library board.

Removing Statutory Obstacles to the Formation of a Joint Library

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 43.001, Legislative findings and declaration of policy, clearly establishes the critical importance of libraries and concludes that "The legislature declares that it is the policy of this state to provide laws for the development and improvement of public libraries, school libraries, and interlibrary cooperation among all types of libraries;" and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 43.03(2) dictates that the State Superintendent of Public Instruction shall "promote, assist, plan and coordinate the organization, development and improvement of public library services and public library systems to serve the needs of all citizens in the state;" and

WHEREAS, counties are charged with providing for library services to residents of those municipalities in the county not maintaining a public library and do so by levying a county tax upon such residents, in accordance with Wis. Stat. § 43.64, and counties are further charged with distributing said county tax revenues to those municipal libraries providing service to residents of those municipalities in the county not maintaining a public library; and

WHEREAS, the imposition of the county library tax ensures all residents of the state pay a tax to support public library services either to their municipality or to the county; therefore, the county library tax is critical to achievement of the public policy stated in statute and referenced above, and the critical nature of the county library tax is emphasized by its exclusion from the property tax levy limits, per Wis. Stat. § 66.0602(3)I; and

WHEREAS, the Village of East Troy, which has a municipal library, Town of Troy, and Town of East Troy have attempted to form a joint Tri-Troy Library, through a three-party joint library agreement, which plan was recommended and approved by the Walworth County Board on July 12, 2022, and which plan received conditional approval from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction that indicates "the establishment of the joint library you proposed may help achieve improved library services to the residents of the Tri-Troy area;" and

WHEREAS, the conflict in application between the county library tax not being subject to levy limits, the municipal expenditures for a joint library being subject to levy limits, the county library tax exemption limits, and the statutory methodology for calculating and applying the county library tax, per Wis. Stat. § 43.64, are complex and can result in unfair, negative fiscal impacts such that the amount of levy limit increase provided to municipalities wanting to directly

fund joint library services can be substantially less than the amount those same communities are paying under the county library tax; and

WHEREAS, this obstacle effectively and significantly restricts the beneficial creation of such a joint library, results in fewer individuals receiving library services directly from their municipality, and runs in direct opposition to the clearly written policy of the State of Wisconsin "to provide laws for development and improvement of public libraries;" and

WHEREAS, to eliminate this obstacle to formation of joint library boards, statutes must be amended such that in the event of the creation of a joint library how much municipal residents paid toward the county library tax is equivalent to how much tax they are allowed to pay directly to their own municipality, and each municipality must be allowed the additional tax levy authority for that amount.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby request that the state statutes be amended "to provide laws for the development and improvement of public libraries" and to promote fairness and equity in how levy limits influence the opportunity to form joint libraries such that in the event of the creation of a joint library how much municipal residents paid toward the county library tax is equivalent to how much they are allowed to pay directly to their own municipality, and each municipality must be given the additional tax levy authority for that amount; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED that to accomplish that purpose the following two statutory amendments, or any other such amendments as may be necessary to effectuate the desired result, should be adopted into state statutes:

1) Amend Wis. Stat. § 43.64(2)I:

I Notwithstanding sub. (2m), any city, village, town, or school district in a county levying a tax for public library service under sub. (1) is exempt from the tax levy if 1. And either 2. Or 3. Apply:

- 1. The city, village, town, or school district is included in a joint library under s. 43.53.
- 2. The city, village, town, or school district levies a tax for public library service, less the amount levied for public library capital expenditures, and appropriates and spends for a library fund during the year for which the county tax levy is made an amount that is not less than the average of the previous 3 years.
- 3. The city, village, town, or school district levies a tax for public library service, less the amount levied for public library capital expenditures, and appropriates and spends for a library fund during the year for which the county tax levy is made an amount that is not less than the amount of the tax levied for the previous year by the County under s. 43.64(1) and is not less than the amount required under s. 43.64(2)(b).
- 2) Create Wis. Stat. § 66.0602(3)(dg):

66.0602(3)(dg). If a political subdivision subject to the tax in s. 43.64(1) increases the services that it provides by adding responsibility and becoming part of a joint library under s. 43.53 and becomes exempt from the tax in s. 43.64(1) in accordance with s. 43.64(2)I,

the levy increase limit otherwise applicable under this section in the current year is increased by an amount equal to the County library tax levy, per s. 43.64(1), applied by the county to that political subdivision in the previous year.

WHEREAS, to be eligible for the Wisconsin Veterans and Surviving Spouses Property Tax Credit the veteran must have a service-connected disability of 100% under 38 USC 1114 or 1134, or a 100% disability rating based on individual unemployability; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Senate Bill 102, currently in the Wisconsin Senate's Universities and Revenue Committee, would increase the eligibility for the Wisconsin Veterans and Surviving Spouses Property Tax Credit to veterans with a service-connected disability of at least 70% under 38 USC 1114 or 1134, or a 100% disability rating based on individual unemployability; and

WHEREAS, veterans are important and contributing citizens of Washburn County; and

WHEREAS, veterans with serious service-related injuries may face reduced earning potential, and some live paycheck to paycheck on fixed incomes that make paying property taxes difficult; and

WHEREAS, expanding the eligibility for the tax credit to veterans with at least a 70% service-connected disability will help veterans stay in homes they already own and help make homes affordable to veterans who want to buy a home for the first time; and

WHEREAS, the benefit of receiving the tax credit will provide veterans more financial resources to spend locally, thus helping the County's economy; and

WHEREAS, several neighboring states, including Minnesota and Michigan, provide similar tax credits to veterans based upon at least a 70% service-connected disability.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support the passage of Wisconsin Senate Bill 102 and requests that the Wisconsin Legislature approve Wisconsin Senate Bill 102 and send it to the Governor as soon as possible.

- 2. Allow the grant to be used for common road, bridge, highway, or tunnel projects, expanding the eligibility for more projects in rural areas.
- 3. Strike the minimum project amount of \$25M, considering that most projects in rural areas are under this amount.
- 4. Lower the cost-share burden for communities with populations less than 5,000, increasing the likelihood projects in these communities can be completed in a timely manner.
- 5. Establish a set-aside of at least 5% of funding under the program to go to communities of less than 5,000 in population, ensuring these communities receive federal assistance for their infrastructure needs.

WHEREAS, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is a fatal neurological disease of cervids which threatens to cause significant economic, cultural and ecological damage to Wisconsin's deer and elk populations; and

WHEREAS, a better understanding of CWD is needed to develop better management tools; and

WHEREAS, current funding and research levels are not commensurate to the threat posed by CWD; and

WHEREAS, since the discovery of CWD in Wisconsin in 2001 it is now found in wild deer in 41 counties and has been found in over 25 captive cervid farms; and

WHEREAS, in the most highly infected areas of Dane and Iowa counties the prevalence rate in adult males is about 50% and in adult females about 35%; and

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Health, the Centers for Disease Control, and the World Health Organization all recommend that cervid meat only be eaten after the animal harvested has tested negative for CWD; and

WHEREAS, in 2023 nearly 800,000 gun and archery deer hunting licenses were sold in Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS, according to a recent study, hunters in Wisconsin spend \$2.5 billion annually. Eighty-eight percent of the hunters in Wisconsin participated in deer hunting, making it the most popular form of hunting in the state.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby urge the State Legislature to fund and direct state agencies to conduct the following research in order to better manage CWD:

- Develop a reliable, rapid, and easy to administer CWD test that can be conducted on live cervids.

- Develop a cervid vaccine for CWD.

WHEREAS, related to a proposed Conservation Easement Purchase by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources on the Phase 2 of the Pelican River Forest, the DNR never followed up to see if any of the affected Towns or counties had sent in a resolution in favor of the purchase of the easement or opposing it as outlined in the notice that the DNR sent to the affected Towns and two of the affected counties; and

WHEREAS, in order to make informed decisions regarding the future planning and development of the County, the Langlade County Board requires information on how each land or easement acquisition by the State of Wisconsin will affect the future tax base, future population and development potential, economic impacts based on various industries and business sectors, future land use and planning restrictions, utility installation restrictions, and trail and access limitations for motorized vehicles and motorized recreational vehicles.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby object to the proposed purchase of a conservation easement by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources of Phase 2 of the Pelican River Forest due to

Relating to

Modernizing and Improving the Wisconsin Farmland Preservation Program

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Farmland Preservation Program (FPP) was established in 1978 to protect the state's most valuable agricultural lands from development, and two avenues were created via legislation: local land use zoning or a special agreement with Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP). Landowners who participated in the program were then eligible for a Wisconsin state income tax credit, if they met the financial criteria and the state's soil conservation standards. The peak years of the program resulted in approximately 23,900 statewide participants; and

WHEREAS, in 2009, Wisconsin made significant changes to the FPP administrative codes and statutes as part of the Working Lands Initiative, a suite of programs to protect farmland from development. Among the many changes to the FPP were setting new flat rates per acre for the income tax credits, adding a process for local areas to establish Agricultural Enterprise Areas (AEA), establishing a Purchase of Agricultural Conservation Easements (PACE) Program, and finally adding additional conservation standards; and

WHEREAS, since the FPP rules were amended in 2009, the costs of implementing the required conservation standards have increased to a point where in some cases the cost of participating in the program has exceeded the available tax credits, which in turn has impacted the statewide program participation, currently estimated at 12,000 participants; and

WHEREAS, the premise of the FPP tax credit was to ensure landowners were compensated for their conservation stewardship and to help offset the costs of implementing and maintaining the required conservation practices. To date this program has been the best available tool to ensure conservation best management practices are being maintained statewide; and

WHEREAS, the long-term net result of aforesaid changes was a decrease in the value of the tax credits to maintain the conservation standards which in turn has decreased the overall enrollment statewide. This decrease in enrollment is alarming and needs to be addressed as soon as possible; and

WHEREAS, local units of government, towns and counties continue to pursue the purchase of agricultural conservation easements through locally funded programs with, in some cases, United States Department of Agriculture - Natural Resources Conservation Service grants. Also,

numerous agricultural conservation easements (ACE) have been donated to local land trusts. Many of the donated ACEs remain eligible for the FPP but are not recognized by DATCP for their true farmland preservation value; and

WHEREAS, local units of government, towns and counties spend considerable staff resources supporting landowners enrolling in the program, offering guidance for improving farmland, and conducting compliance checks needed to qualify for the tax credit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support and urge the Wisconsin Legislature to pass legislation to modernize and improve the Farmland Preservation Program to increase the allowable tax credits; amend the program eligibility to allow landowners who have Agricultural Conservation Easements the ability to participate in the FPP, if they meet the financial and conservation criteria; establish a new tax credit level for Agricultural Conservation Easements; increase the frequency of review of the Farmland Preservation Program allowable tax credits to assure they are meeting the basic costs associated with program participation; and expand eligibility of the FPP planning grant funds to support program implementation to be utilized by counties, local municipalities, planning commissions, and tribal governments for their FPP implementation efforts.

Supporting Funding for County Child Support IT Modernization Project

WHEREAS, Monroe County administers their Child Support Program on behalf of the state, providing a holistic set of services to many of its 47,000 County residents including paternity establishment, assistance with finding employment, obtaining child support and establishing health insurance orders for children, enforcing and modifying these orders; and

WHEREAS, child support is one of the most effective anti-poverty programs in the state, with county child support agencies serving approximately 343,000 children and collecting roughly \$864 million in support for families in fiscal year 2022; and

WHEREAS, child support is proven to reduce childhood poverty rates, lead to better educational and behavioral outcomes for children, and have a positive effect on food security, health, and housing stability; and

WHEREAS, county child support agencies work closely with both parents to ensure that they have the help they need to be successful, including assistance with finding employment, referrals to other social service programs, and right-sizing orders for individuals impacted by substance use disorders or other challenges; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program is incredibly cost-effective, collecting an average of \$5.96 in support for every dollar invested in the program; and

WHEREAS, each year, the child support enforcement program processes more than \$850 million in child support collections, provides paternity establishment services for more than 23,000 children, creates and prints more than 1 million customizable documents at local agencies, and generates an additional 4 million form documents centrally; and

WHEREAS, the Kids Information Data System (KIDS) is the primary system used by state, county, and tribal staff for all of the child support enforcement case and financial management functions; and

WHEREAS, the child support agencies are challenged by software that was created in 1996, which lacks basic modern functionality like drop-down menus and point-and-click technology and contributes to staffing challenges as a majority of child support agencies report

that it takes two or more years for new employees to be familiarized and efficient with this system; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Children and Families prepared a report assessing the needs for modernizing its child support enforcement information technology systems and identified several deficiencies in the current system needing improvement, including that the KIDS system: (a) lacks a maintainable architecture; (b) lacks modern functionality for its workforce and users; (c) does not provide necessary capabilities to support program needs; and (d) does not support data-driven decision making; and

WHEREAS, the lack of automation and information needed by county child support caseworkers, and the limited ability to customize current lists and reports, causes caseworkers to increase the amount of time they spend preparing and reviewing reports to manage their caseloads; and

WHEREAS, as a result of system limitations, workers are then solving system problems instead of delivering services, hampering their productivity and customer service; and

WHEREAS, work on a new system, which is called Thrive, for the Child Support Program commenced development in January 2021 and is expected to be implemented in 2027; and

WHEREAS, one-time funding of \$22,019,900 (\$7,486,800 GPR and \$14,533,100 Federal Match) was put in the 2023-2025 budget for the new system, which had to be spent in that biennium; and

WHEREAS, continued funding for Thrive is needed in the next budget for the work to continue on the new system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support continued state funding for a child support modern web-based information technology system. This investment will ensure that Wisconsin counties can continue to effectively provide economic support to our children.

WHEREAS, the Bureau of Highway Maintenance has added 10% inflation to the equipment rate calculation due to the cost to procure equipment; and

WHEREAS, the RMA, which funds the equipment rates, has not received adequate funding to absorb the increase; and

WHEREAS, inadequate funding for RMA has resulted in further limiting of projects; and

WHEREAS, the insufficient funding will cause deferred maintenance on roadways which will result in infrastructure failure and more expensive future projects; and

WHEREAS, without additional state funds for road maintenance, the county may need to further reduce the number of projects that can be completed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support the request for additional funding through budgetary surplus with said funding allocated to the county routine maintenance fund.


