
## Jefferson County 4-H

### Try something new: Jefferson County 4-Hers offered Project Learning Day

FORT ATKINSON — Rockwell Elementary School in Fort Atkinson buzzed with activity Saturday as 4-Hers from age 5 through 19, plus parents, grandparents and preschool siblings, joined to explore a variety of interest areas at the Jefferson County 4-H program's annual Project Learning Day.

In one room, older youth and adults learned how genetics determined color in animals' coats and how to find their own rabbit or cat's genetic code.

Down the hall, youngsters dug through mounds of Lego bricks to create a boat design that would stay afloat in a dishpan filled with water.

Other students learned sewing techniques to create decorative aprons, mixed and modeled candy clay, stitched woodland animal designs with embroidery thread, learned about freeze-drying, investigated the process of creating constructed languages, and developed marketing and communications skills for selling meat animals.

Jerry Wilcenski, 4-H educator and program director for Jefferson County 4-H, said that this annual event has always drawn a crowd of youth and family members from around the county, and this year was no exception. In fact, he said this year there were even more classes offered than in recent years.

Project Learning Day has gone on for more than a generation and serves as an opportunity for youth to explore their interests or try something new, learning from volunteers within the community. Alongside the 4-Hers, many family members also

took part, some of them participating directly as students and others assisting little ones in the classes. Each year the offering of classes at Family Project Day differs, with a variety of crafts, foods, sewing, arts, science-based classes, animal based classes and more.

This year, Mark Mahoney, who grew up attending Project Learning Day classes from creative writing to making original games to nature exploration, was among the youth instructors teaching a class of his own, introducing youngsters to one of his passions, model railroading.

Mahoney, 19, Whitewater, a member of the Ideal Clever Clovers 4-H Club, was surrounded by a bevy of students from age 5 on up, all getting hands-on

experience with Mahoney's elaborate model train set-up as they learned the basics of the hobby.

Rockwell Elementary in Fort Atkinson has served as the site for Project Learning Day for the past few years. Prior to that it took place at Johnson Creek Elementary School. The event has always brought in 4-Hers and their family members from all across the county.

"It's a wonderful experience," said Kim Kreger, who has organized the event for the past several years. "It gives kids the opportunity to explore topics that spark their interest, including things they might not normally be involved in."

Among the classes offered this year were making a 4-H clover "mug rug"; jelly making, kitchen scrap gardens, sublimation art, bracelet-making, cute food crafts, and watercolor workshop, among many more.

Several of the teachers have volunteered for numerous years, like Sharon Schweitzer, who oversees the natural sciences and plants projects for the county 4-H program. This year, students in one of her classes were exploring the lives of caterpillars,

# Agriculture Crops & Soils

- Planning for a spring weed management educational talk for the county highway departments in collaboration with Mark Renz and Matt Wallrath (WI First Detector Network). The goal is to provide research based recommendations for weed control and vegetation management on right of ways to control the spread of invasive weeds while reducing the amount of time and capital investment by the highway departments.
- A panel discussion for educators, agronomy industry and agency professionals where attendees learned about the Nitrogen Optimization Pilot Program (NOPP) to increase awareness of nitrogen management results and involvement in the program. The goal of the presentation as a panelist was to discuss experience with the program as an extension educator and fiscal agent.
- Planning for a four session Focus on Forage webinar series for forage growers and agriculture consultants in collaboration with the Natural Resource Conservation Service and the US Dairy Forage Research Center. The goal is to provide research based forage management solutions to improve forage quality and meet producer goals.
- An on-farm research project to determine the performance of five winter barley varieties at
  different planting dates, where performance is determined by winter survival, yield as well as
  malt, forage, and feed analysis. Results from this study will help determine if/how winter
  barley can be integrated into Wisconsin cropping systems and if it can serve as an
  overwintering cover crop that can potentially garner higher prices and yield than winter
