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## **Incinerators**

Wi. Stat. NR 502 - Solid Waste Storage, Transportation, ... Incineration ...

- Governs all solid waste storage ... incineration ... except hazardous waste, metallic mining
- 502.09 Incinerators:
  - o "No person may operate a solid waste incinerator unless the person complies with the general requirements in s. NR 502.04 and has obtained a plan of operation approval as specified in sub. (4) and an operating license from the department."
  - o Exemption for incinerators having a capacity of 500 pounds per hour or less
    - Facility shall be designed and operated in conformance with emission limitations of state air pollution control regulations in chs. NR 400 and 499
  - 502.09 (3) provides location criteria 250' from private well, 1,200' from public water supply
  - o 502.09 (4) plan of operation plot plan showing fences, gates, barriers, equipment layout and flow, utilities, etc.
  - o 502.09 (5) operational requirements nuisance-free operation, shelter, sanitary facilities and many other minimum requirements for operation
  - o 502.09 (6) ash characterization establishes ash testing program
- NR 502 regulates solid waste incinerators, provides minimum standards and operates shall obtain approval from DNR and have an operating license

Wi. Stat. NR 499 - Training and Certification Requirements for Solid Waste Treatment Facility Operators

- Establishes a "program for the training and certification of solid waste treatment facility operators"
- Establishes training requirements, ligense/certification requirements and requirements for licensed individual to be on-site during operation

Wi. Stat. Ch. 287 - Solid Waste Reduction, Recovery and Recycling

Regulates and prohibits certain incineration activities

## Agricultural Incinerators:

When used at a facility regulated by ATCP 51, the incinerator is regulated as part of the operation.

- Emissions are regulated as part of the DNR Air Pollution Control Permit
  - o Has reference to EPA Standards within permit
- Also regulated as part of the facilities Mortality Plan

- What is the problem the Ordinance is trying to resolve?
- What is the goal of the Ordinance?
- Is the training reference relevant to the operation? Will the training cover topics related to agricultural, veterinarian and human uses?
- How many are present currently in the County?
- Who would administer the Ordinance? Zoning?
  - o Is there adequate staff time to administer Ordinance?
    - Would need to track down each incinerator, enforce ordinance, track operators and continuing education?
- Ordinance is narrowly focused at specific groups
- Are these already regulated? Do we need another layer of regulations?

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Incinerators—Further information for Jefferson Co. Solid Waste and Air Quality Committee Prepared and submitted by Vic Karaliunas and Anita Martin (May 6, 2019)

A two-page handout was given to the SWAQ Committee by County Zoning staff prior to the March 8, 2019 meeting.

The following statements made on handout require clarification: "When used at a facility regulated by ATCP 51, the incinerator is regulated as part of the operation."

ATCP 51/WI Livestock Siting Law falls under the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DACTP) and is not governed by WI DNR legislation. ATCP 51 language does not address incineration safety.

The handout states, "Emissions are regulated as part of the DNR Air Pollution Control Permit." Most agricultural establishments in Wisconsin do not have a DNR Air Pollution Control Permit. Information obtained through an Open Records Request shows less than 20 out of 300 large-scale agricultural operations (Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations or CAFOs) in Wisconsin currently have air pollution permits. Therefore, most farms, if they decided to install an incinerator or cremator, would not automatically be regulated by the WI DNR air management program.

One Jefferson County facility, which has had an air pollution permit since 2012, only recently (April 2019) had its air permit amended to correctly include emissions from the incineration unit. This example shows the DNR is not aware of all of the incinerator units which are subject to the agency's regulation.

The following questions were posed on Page 2 of the handout—

- 1. What is the problem the Ordinance is trying to resolve? At present, no local system is in use to help ensure safe location and safe operation of high-temperature incinerators/cremators in Jefferson County. The Draft Ordinance proposed at the March 8, 2019 SWAQ Committee, Section 1.6 Findings of Fact (Page 3), states, "Wisconsin NR 499.03(9) currently exempts the DNR from requiring cremator operator certification for the following: veterinarian animal euthanasia, human cremation facilities, and agricultural cremator/incinerator operators." The exemption which WI NR 499.03(9) provides, coupled with the lack of adequate DNR funding and staffing, means State oversight of incinerators is also not sufficient. This puts humans, animals, and the environment at risk.
- 2. What is the goal of the Ordinance? Section 1.3 (Page 1) of the Incinerator Operation and Siting Ordinance (proposed) states the purpose of the Ordinance:
  - To promote the protection of public health, safety, and general welfare of the people of the County of Jefferson.
  - To help minimize human, animal, and environmental risks associated with incineration.

- To ensure persons operating incinerator/cremator waste treatment equipment are adequately trained before using the equipment.
- To provide for the administration and enforcement of standards necessary to protect residents from incorrect incineration or cremation practices.
- 3. Is the training referenced relevant to the operation? Will the training cover topics related to agricultural, veterinarian, and human uses? The information is available through the WI DNR, as to what is currently in the curriculum.
- 4. How many are currently present in the County? Unfortunately, there is no way at this time of knowing how many units are operating in Jefferson County, and where they are located. Having an Ordinance such as this requires the County to verify operators have successfully completed training before using incinerator/cremator equipment; therefore, the County would be aware of how many units and where they are located. This knowledge helps first responders provide the best assistance possible in the event of a fire or natural disaster.

As of Jan. 1, 2019, two incinerators were known to be operating in Jefferson Co., one in Palmyra and one in Lake Mills. As a result of a fire, the incinerator in Lake Mills has not reportedly been operating since January 8.

The NFIRS report completed by the fire official lists the Incident Type as Classification

115-Incinerator overload or malfunction. (FDID 28050, Incident Number 190004).

- 5. Who would administer the Ordinance? Zoning? There is an existing County Zoning Ordinance 11.05(g) which pertains to Solid Waste Disposal Operations and includes incinerators. It requires annual licensure as well as an application through the Zoning Administrator.
- **6.** Are these already regulated? This appears to be an unanswered question, given what is listed in County Zoning Ordinance Chapter 11.
- 7. Do we need another layer of regulations? Does the current regulation include incinerator operator certification, and does it indicate to the County where the incinerators are located? The proposed ordinance would cover these aspects.

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## County of Jefferson ---Incinerator Operation and Siting Ordinance\* (proposed)

## **SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION**

- 1.1 <u>Title.</u> This ordinance shall be referred to as the Incinerator Operation and Siting Ordinance.
- 1.2 <u>Authority.</u> This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the powers granted in the Wisconsin Constitution. Further, this ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted by Wisconsin Statutes 59.01, 59.02, and 59.03(1), for the purpose of protecting public health, safety, and general welfare, and to maintain and protect the environment for the people of Jefferson County.
- 1.3 Purpose. The purpose of this Ordinance is as follows:
  - (1) To promote the protection of public health, safety, and general welfare of the people of the County of Jefferson.
  - (2) To help minimize human, animal, and environmental risks associated with incineration.
  - (3) To ensure persons operating incinerator/cremator waste treatment equipment are adequately trained before using the equipment.
  - (4) To provide for the administration and enforcement of standards necessary to protect residents from incorrect incineration or cremation practices.
- 1.4 <u>Applicability.</u> This ordinance applies to all existing and proposed veterinarian animal euthanasia, human cremation, and agricultural incinerators/cremators in Jefferson County.
- 1.5 <u>Definitions.</u> Unless specifically defined herein, the following terms have the meaning as provided for in Wis. Stats. cs.92 and 281:
  - (1) "Person" means an individual, corporation, partnership, cooperative association, limited liability company, trust, or other legal organization or entity.
  - (2) "County" means County of Jefferson, Wisconsin.
  - (3) "Incinerator" means a device which maintains a controlled process by which solid waste is thermally altered into gases and residue containing little or no combustible material." Source: NR 287.13 (17) (a).
  - (4) "Crematory" means a facility that has a combustion device for the purpose of burning exclusively human corpses or animal bodies. (WI Legislature NR 499.02 (6)

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- (5) "Certified Operator" means a person who has completed an approved training program, passed an examination in accordance with the requirements outlined in WI NR 499, and has been issued a certificate by the DNR. (WI Legislature: 499.02(4)
- (6) "Chief Facility Operator" means a person who has completed an approved training program and passed a DNR-examination at this certification level. A chief facility operator is responsible for the overall supervision and monitoring of performance of the waste treatment equipment and facility personnel. (WI Legislature 499.02(5) The duties and responsibilities of the chief facility operator are outlined in WI NR 499.06 (1).
- (7) "Interim Chief Facility Operator" means a shift operator temporarily assigned the duties of a chief facility operator.
- (8) "Shift Operator" means a person who has completed an approved training program and passed a DNR examination at this certification level. A shift operator is responsible for the supervising and monitoring of performance of the waste treatment equipment and facility personal during an assigned shift.
- 1.6 Findings of Fact. The County of Jefferson makes the following findings of fact in support of this ordinance:
  - (1) The Jefferson County Board of Supervisors is a leadership body which takes actions on issues in the county that foster public safety, health, and environmental protection.
  - (2) Incineration involves burning solid wastes in a controlled fashion, to reduce volume and weight, as well as to change the characteristics of the waste. Safe location and safe operation of high-temperature incinerators/cremators are important for air pollution control, worker safety, and fire protection.
  - (3) Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) offers an incinerator operator certification program which includes "training on incinerator operations, health and safety training while performing incinerator operator duties, incinerator management issues and incinerator design and construction."

    (https://dnr.wi.gov/opcert/incinerator.html)
  - (4) Animal incinerators/cremators are currently used in at least two municipalities in Jefferson County; the exact number and location of existing units is not known.
  - (5) Incinerators/cremators which reach 1200 to 1600 degrees have grown in popularity statewide as well as nationally since the 2015 avian influenza outbreak.

(6) Over the next 12 to 24 months, incinerator/cremator use is projected to triple in the County, for agricultural mortality waste. (WI DNR Air Pollution Construction Permit 18-JJW-054; October 17, 2108; El Facility Number 128027350)

- (7) Presently, no system is in place at the local level for tracking, monitoring, and overseeing incineration or cremation activities in Jefferson County.
- (8) WI NR 499.03(9) currently exempts the DNR from requiring cremator operator certification for the following: veterinarian animal euthanasia, human cremation facilities, and agricultural cremator/incinerator operators.

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(9) After consultation with governing officials from WI DNR and Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (WI DATCP), it appears no legal barriers to enacting a local/county ordinance requiring operator certification exist.

## 1.7 Incinerator Siting.

- (1) An incinerator/cremator shall be sited in accordance with USDA NRCS guidelines. ("Incineration of Animal Mortality," Sheet No. AL316A; https://efotg.sc.egov.usda.gov/references/public/AL/al316aincAnialMortal.pdf)
- (2) Jefferson County Solid Waste and Air Quality Committee ("the Committee") shall review existing incinerators/cremators for compliance with Section 1.7 (1) of this ordinance and shall approve proposed siting of all new incinerators/cremators prior to installation in Jefferson County.

## 1.8 Incinerator Operation.

- (1) One or more Certified Operators shall be on site during the operation of an incinerator/cremator, including for the duration of the burndown cycle for facilities with incineration units having air pollution control devices.
- (2) Any facility in Jefferson County which has an incinerator/cremator that does not have an air pollution control device shall employ at least one Shift Operator.
- (3) Any facility having an incinerator/cremator equipped with an air pollution control device shall employ at least one Chief Facility operator or Interim Chief Facility Operator. Certification levels for chief facility operator and shift operator are defined in WI NR 499.06 (1)
  - a. The Chief Facility Operator's duties include ensuring that shift operators are trained and certified as required, and are familiar with applicable federal, state, and local environmental regulations. This individual is also responsible for operating the equipment in compliance with applicable federal, state, and local laws. (WI NR 499.06) The Chief Facility Operator is responsible for ensuring the incinerator is not charged at a rate that exceeds its design capacity.

- (4) The owner, and their designated waste operator in the event of a contractual party or designee, shall be responsible for securing all required permits, approvals, and registration, and for the operation of the units in accordance with applicable laws, rules, and regulations. Permits must be obtained prior to construction and operation.
- (5) The owner of the facility, and their designated waste operator in the event of a contractual party or designee, shall notify the DNR and the designated party at Jefferson County, in writing of the appointment of an Interim Chief Facility Operator within 10 days of the appointment. The appointment is valid for 6 months and may be renewed. (WI NR 499.04 (2c)
- (6) All operator certificates shall be displayed on the premise of the facility where certified incinerator/cremator operators are employed.
- (7) As the body charged with addressing waste removal and air quality concerns in the County, the Committee shall be responsible for verifying individuals receive the required certification prior to operating incinerators or cremators in Jefferson County. The Committee shall also be responsible for monitoring and ensuring refresher training is obtained in a timely fashion, as outlined in Section 1.8 and Section 1.9 of this ordinance, and in accordance with the initial training and refresher training parameters outlined in WI NR 499.08, WI NR 499.09 and WI NR 499.10.

## 1.9 Operator Certification.

- (1) Operation of incinerator/cremator equipment is prohibited prior to verification by the Committee of the operator(s) successful completion of certified incinerator operator training through the Wisconsin DNR.
- (2) All Equipment Operators shall complete four (4) hours of Continuing Education Credits annually through the WI DNR as required by WI NR 499.
- Interpretation. In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this Ordinance shall be held to be minimum requirements and shall be liberally construed in favor of the County of Jefferson, and shall not be deemed a limitation or repeal of any other power granted by the Wisconsin Statutes.

## 1.11 Severability.

1 Severability.
(1) Should any section, clause, provision, or portion of this ordinance be adjudged to be unconstitutional or invalid, unlawful, or unenforceable by a final order of a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of the ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. 2 8 775 14

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(2) If any application of this ordinance to a particular parcel of land is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a final order of the court of competent jurisdiction, such judgement shall not be applicable to any other parcel of land not specifically included in said judgment.

## SECTION 2: ADMINISTRATION

- 2.1 County Powers. The County may:
  - (1) Refer a violation of this Ordinance to the County's legal counsel for legal action.
  - (2) Issue a citation for a violation of this ordinance.
  - (3) Use any other lawful means to administer and enforce this Ordinance.
- 2.2. <u>Administrative Duties.</u> In the administration and enforcement of this ordinance, the County shall:
  - (1) Investigate complaints relating to compliance with this ordinance.
  - (2) Keep an accurate record of all inspections made, and other official actions.
  - (3) Inspection Authority. The County may make any inspection necessary under this Ordinance to protect public health and safety. Where the County does not have permission to enter lands subject to this ordinance for inspection purposes, entry shall be according to Wis. Stat. 66.0119. Refusal to grant permission to enter lands affected by this Ordinance for inspection purposes pursuant to the requirements of s. 66.0119 shall be grounds for initiating an enforcement action.

## SECTION 3: VIOLATIONS, PENALTIES, AND APPEALS

## 3.1 Violations.

- (1) It is unlawful for any person to violate Section 1.7, Section 1.8, and Section 1.9 of this ordinance.
- (2) It is unlawful for any person to knowingly provide false information, make a false statement, or fail to provide or misrepresent any material fact to a County agent, board, commission, department, employee, officer, or official acting in an official capacity under this ordinance.

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- (3) It is unlawful for a person to disobey; fail, neglect, or refuse to comply with; or otherwise resist an order issued pursuant to this ordinance.
- (4) It is unlawful for an individual to operate an incinerator/cremation unit after suspension or revocation of his/her operator's certificate, as outlined and defined in NR 499.12.

## 3.2 Penalties.

- (1) This ordinance may be enforced through civil forfeiture or through issuance of an injunction by the circuit court in an action initiated by the County.
- (2) A person shall, upon conviction for a violation of this ordinance, forfeit not less than \$50 dollars, nor more than \$500 dollars for each conviction, plus the applicable costs for prosecution for each violation, and may be ordered to take such action as is necessary to abate the offense within a specified time.
- (3) Each day a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.
- (4) In the event an offense is not abated as ordered, the County may take such action as is necessary to abate the offense, and the cost of such abatement will become a lien upon the person's property and may be collected in the same manner as other taxes.
- 3.3 <u>Appeals</u>. Any person aggrieved by a decision of the County may seek review before the Board of Adjustment.

## SECTION 4: EFFECTIVE DATE

The ordinance shall take effect upon passage by the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors of the County of Jefferson, Wisconsin upon publication provided by law.

Hello again Blair,

Here is another possible change to the incinerator ordinance, for your consideration. (Pasted below.)

- 1.1 Purpose
- (2) To help minimize human, animal (livestock, wildlife, and domestic), and environmental risks associated with incineration.

- 1.1 Purpose. The purpose of this Ordinance is as follows:
  - (1) To promote the protection of public health, safety, and general welfare of the people of the County of Jefferson.
  - (2) To help minimize human, animal, and environmental risks associated with incineration.
  - (3) To identify the location of incineration/cremator units, so first responders can provide the best assistance possible in the event of a fire or natural disaster.
  - (4) To ensure persons operating incinerator/cremator waste treatment equipment are adequately trained before using the equipment.
  - (5) To provide for the administration and enforcement of standards necessary to protect residents, industry workers, first responders, agricultural structures and equipment, and other buildings and property from incorrect incineration or cremation practices.
  - (6) To help protect business interests and reduce potential liability risks.
- 1.2 <u>Findings of Fact.</u> The County of Jefferson makes the following findings of fact in support of this ordinance:
  - (1) The Jefferson County Board of Supervisors is a leadership body which takes actions on issues in the county that foster public safety, health, and environmental protection.
  - (2) Incineration involves burning solid wastes in a controlled fashion, to reduce volume and weight, as well as to change the characteristics of the waste.
  - (3) Safe location and safe operation of high-temperature incinerators/cremators are important for air pollution control, worker safety, and fire protection. In accordance with the Clean Air Act, EPA-regulated air emissions from these units include benzene, hexane, formaldehyde, and dioxin (T,C,D,D--(2,3,7,8-tetrachlorodibenzo-p-dioxin.)
  - (4) Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) offers an incinerator operator certification program which includes "training on incinerator operations, health and safety training while performing incinerator operator duties, incinerator management issues and incinerator design and construction."

  - (5) Animal incinerators/cremators are currently used in at least two municipalities in Jefferson County; the exact number and location of existing units is not known.
  - (6) Incinerators/cremators which reach 1200 to 1600 degrees have grown in popularity statewide as well as nationally since the 2015 avian influenza outbreak. New information indicates incinerators are now being used to help reduce PFAS, toxic

- chemicals in soils in some rural and urban areas, an application which is expected to increase in the foreseeable future.
- (7) Over the next 12 to 24 months, incinerator/cremator use is projected to triple in the County, for agricultural mortality waste. (WI DNR Air Pollution Construction Permit 18-JJW-054; October 17, 2108; EI Facility Number 128027350)
- (8) Presently, no system is in place at the local level for tracking, monitoring, and overseeing incineration or cremation activities in Jefferson County.
- (9) WI NR 499.03(9) currently exempts the DNR from requiring cremator operator certification for the following: veterinarian animal euthanasia, human cremation facilities, and agricultural cremator/incinerator operators.
- (10)After consultation with governing officials from WI DNR and Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (WI DATCP), it appears no legal barriers to enacting a local/county ordinance requiring operator certification exist.

The 2019 fair booth was located in West Exhibit Hall building #14 that is right off of the Activity Center. The booth was located next to the Emergency Management and the Veterans Office. Including our booth, there were a total of 6 booths total. There were many empty stalls for vendor also. According to Donna Haugom with Emergency Management, the foot traffic was way down from the past years. Due to the location there were a lot of kids who would come through because of the wheel.

At the booth, I had brochures, Comprehensive Plan information, and the wheel with questions. The wheel attracted kids which gave plenty of educating opportunities. The wheel had different objects on each section. When the wheel was finished spinning, I would ask how they should dispose of the object landed on. If they got the answer correct or had a better idea than the options I provided, they would get a piece of candy. If the wheel landed on the prize slot, they would get to choose a mini basketball or a reusable grocery bag. For the booth, almost 1,000 suckers, 30 mini basketballs and about 50 reusable bags were given away as prizes. 





## Best Practice Guide: For Successful School Milk & Juice Carton Recycling Programs

## Dear Custodial Staff:

Congratulations on your school carton recycling program! Our elementary, middle and high schools generate over 23 million milk and juice cartons every year. That's a lot of cartons! Thanks to your assistance in this program, we are able to divert more of those cartons from going to the landfill. Since recycling milk/juice cartons takes a little extra effort than other types of recycling, we have put together a Best Practice Guide to help you achieve a successful milk/juice carton recycling program.

We know that some of you have successful programs right now and we would appreciate hearing from you about what is working at your school so that it can be shared with other custodians. Please direct all helpful tips for a successful milk/juice carton recycling program to Trey Miller at Mecklenburg County (Trey.Miller@MecklenburgCountyNC.gov).

As mentioned above, recycling milk/juice cartons does take some extra effort. In order for the cartons to be recycled back into paper products it is very important that the cartons be empty of all liquids and that no food, straws or other trash be thrown into the carton recycling container. Wet cartons that are contaminated with food and other garbage will jeopardize the recycling program for the entire school district. If a school has excessive liquid or garbage in their milk/juice carton recycling containers they will not be able to participate in this program.

## **Getting Started**

## SUPPLY LIST:

- Recycling Container For students to toss empty milk and juice cartons into. (Provided by Mecklenburg County, The Carton Council and State Grant)
- 2. **Bucket/Container** For students to empty any leftover milk that they don't drink. This container should be small enough for the custodian to handle once it is filled with residual milk. Using too large of a container may result in a container too heavy to lift. (Provided by school)
- 3. **Poster** To display in the area where students are recycling their milk and juice cartons. (Provided by Carton Council)



- 4. **Empty Here Sign** To be pasted to bucket for residual milk that students don't finish drinking. (Provided by Mecklenburg County, The Carton Council and State Grant)
- 5. **Recycle Here Sign** To be pasted on the recycling container that students will toss their empty carton into. (Provided by Mecklenburg County, The Carton Council and State Grant)

## Carton Council

## **SET UP:**

We understand that every school has a slightly different set up for their cafeteria, but these guidelines will help ensure that the school milk/juice cartons that are recycled are empty of all milk and free of food contamination and other garbage.

- 1. Set up your trash and recycling stations so that students must disassemble their food trays in the following order:
  - a. A Bucket/Container for Leftover Liquids Students must empty their residual milk/juice into this container.
  - b. Recycling Container Students should then toss their empty milk or juice carton, as well as recyclable plastic bottles into the recycling container.
  - c. Garbage can Students must empty all food waste and trash into the garbage can.
- 2. It is important that a student, volunteer, parent or someone from the custodial or cafeteria staff monitor the recycling station to make sure all students are recycling their cartons correctly.
- 3. The residual liquids bucket should be emptied before it gets too heavy to lift.
- 4. The carton recycling container may have to be emptied after breakfast, in between meal periods, or after lunch.
- 5. All residual milk buckets and recycling containers should be emptied and rinsed at the end of the day.
- 6. Once the recycling container is full, or at the end of the day, the container should be taken to the outside recycling dumpster and emptied. If you use a plastic bag to line the recycling container, **do not** place this plastic liner in the outside recycling dumpster. Place it in the garbage. Cartons must be loose in the outside recycling dumpster so that they have a chance to air-dry.
